The Housing Authority has received funding from the Department of Housing and Urban Development to remodel and expand Ocean Spray Community Center, Newport, and to renovate the 30 living units which make up the Newport public housing project.

EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE

To all Siletz Tribal Members between the ages of 18-35 that possess 1/4 or more blood quantum: we have two programs that you might be interested in, Adult Vocational Training and Direct Employment Assistance.

Adult Vocational Training: training can be up to 24 months except for nursing and that can be up to 36 months. The activities are; institutional, on-the-job, apprenticeship training, direct employment assistance. Approved applicants can receive assistance for tuition, books, travel, supplies, required tools and family subsistence.

Direct Employment Assistance: this consists of

services financial and contact, provided eligible Indian persons to obtain reasonable and satisfactory employment. This is for the purpose of gaining or keeping a job; it is not used as a supplement for a gainfully employed Indian.

The program currently has eight pending applications. Those applications are currently being updated and reviewed. A Determination will be made by the end of August on who will be accepted into the program.

We are encouraging Tribal Members and other Indians to contact the Salem Area Office, 393-3903, if you are interested in starting the application process.

PARENT TRAINING WORKSHOP

On July 30th, the Tribe's Indian Child Welfare Program will again present a training workshop for parents of tribal children. The workshop will be in Springfield at the Red Lion Motor Inn, located on the east side of the I-5 Freeway at the Beltline Exit. The workshop will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Child care and transportation will be available upon request. Presentors will include Jim Cooper speaking on discipline and respect, and Susan Hoffman talking on alcohol related parenting

SUMMER YOUTH PROGRAM — The 1983 Youth Opportunity Program began on July 5. The program will last through August 31, 1983. The youth crew consists of nine Tribal members, the ages range from 14 thru 21. The projects that are to be performed by the youth crew are grounds-keeping of Government Hill, community service, assisting Tribal members, construction of annual Pow-Wow and yard work for the Siletz Tribal Offices.

TITLE IV-A INDIAN EDUCATION

We have just completed our first activity for the month of July. Our first encampment was held at Moonshine Park (upper Logsdon) July 11th thru the 17th. The last day was family day which was for all parents and family members of the students who participated in the encampment. B-B-Q chicken, various salads, Indian fried bread, pork spare-ribs and rice egg rolls and desserts were served as main dishes. Approximately 60 students and adults were present throughout the encampment, 40 of those being Tribal members. It was a very successful week and fun was had by all. Looking forward to the 2nd Moonshine Encampment which will be August 15-19.

Thursday, July 15 during the encampment, we loaded up the Dance Group "Selene's Many Moccasins" to meet the Mt. Hebo Wagon Train which arrived in Tillamook, OR. the night before. They invited our dance group to dinner and to perform for the pioneers around the campfire. We had arrived at Tillamook early enough before dinner, so took the students to the "Pioneer Museum" where they were very much impressed with all the rooms and displays of many different things. In their findings at the Museum, they spotted Indian baskets which had been donated by the Siletz Tribe and a rose beaded bat that also had been made by a Siletz Tribal

Member. They were all excited and glad that they participated.
