My name is Sharon (Met-calf) Butler, and I now reside in Clatskanie, Oregon.

For the past five years I have worked for the CTSI as a Johnson O'Malley Coordinator and a Community Health Representative. The programs dealt with the unique needs of our Indian children and their families. During this time I developed a true sense of compassion for our people. Working beyond my job descriptions and sometimes on my own, I

helped members write letters to Tribal Council, for medical needs, financial aid with education and personal grants. Some of the other needs were assisting in explaining housing applications and the Revenue Sharing Budget to the best of my knowledge. On yearly events I helped with the County toy drive and Xmas baskets for our people in need. Two years in a row I helped with the Salmon cleaning and wrapping of approximately 4,000 pounds, to be put into the Tribal food bank. I made myself available to any program that I could help. While working with these different programs, I got to know their directors and how their system worked.

What I have to offer you as a Tribal Council person is my five years of knowledge working with Tribal programs, and I would help you in any way that I can. I am aware of Tribal business, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the Federal regulations. I would try and make honest and good decisions to benefit you the people.

World War two started, I served in the Navy and was stationed with the 7th Fleet in the South Pacific on an aircraft carrier.

I was elected to serve on the Siletz Tribal Council for

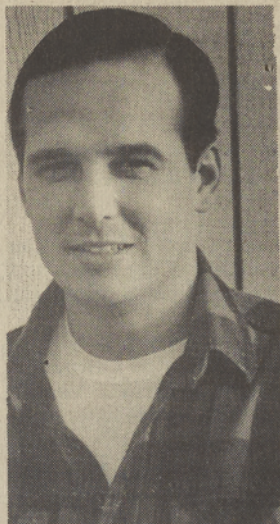

will benefit in some way because of our restoration.

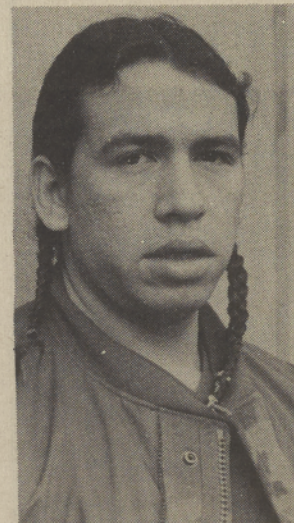

NATIVE AMERICAN COASTAL INDIAN FISHERIES NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION FOR INDIAN PEOPLE.

We must take a look at the possibilities funding for all programs.

1. Fishing and Hunting whole Oregon Coast, by rights inherited by Indian people, cleaning of rivers, S.T.E.P. program OSU.

2. Building smoke sheds.

3. Building places to can and clean fish and other sea life.

4. Permission to have fish bakes at different reservations: Grande Ronde, Siletz, Cow Creek, Rogue River, all our family by blood.

5. Housing for Indian people. People willing to work to help build housing (lodges).

6. Construction of fish weirs to collect and make records of fish counts, records of fish that have been in the past.

Where have they gone and if they went to fish markets, who gave them the right? Why do they tell us we would not benefit if we open hatcheries, canneries, smoke

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
