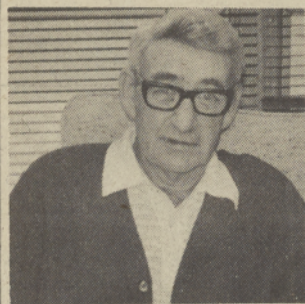




General Manager's Report

The following is the General Manager's Report on current happenings in the tribal administration.

Jim Willis, formerly the JTPA Employment Counselor from Salem, has been appointed to the position of Siletz Field Representative/Housing Coordinator. Jim has extensive knowledge in home construction and remodeling and will add a lot to his new position. He can be reached at 444-2517 to answer any questions you may have.

Terry Russell, a tribal member, was hired to replace Jim Willis as the JTPA Employment Counselor in the Salem Office. He has only been on a short while, but is certainly doing well. He can be reached at 393-3903.

Phil Rilatos, a tribal member from Waldport, reported to work on June 25th, as the new Tribal Comptroller. Phil is in charge of the entire Accounting Department. He comes to us with many years of experience. He can be reached at 444-2536.

To better serve tribal members, we have formed a management team consisting of the General Manager, Human Resources Manager, and the Tribal Comptroller. These three people will meet on a weekly basis to review program progress, intercept problems, and generally to better enhance services to tribal members.

Due to numerous on-the-job injuries, our insurance rates have more than doubled with SAIF (Workmen's Compensation). Thus, we have instigated an extensive training program to reduce on-the-job injuries. The Forestry Department, JTPA crews, and all tribal staff will undergo numerous training sessions in the proper use of appropriate equipment, such as chain saws, lawnmowers, weed-eaters, tractors, etc. We will also be talking about the use of proper clothing, goggles, safety glasses, ear plugs, etc, as well as some outside professionals in the field to assist us in our endeavor. We feel it is the duty of all staff to work towards a safer work environment, and are behind them 100% in their efforts to reduce on-the-job injuries.

The Salem Area Office moved into another office space within the same office complex. They still have the same address and telephone number.

We are continuing to invest timber monies through the B.I.A. We have been able to obtain a good return on our money by investing in 90-day time periods. We are currently receiving 12.29 - 13.05 percent interest on our investment.

At the present time all of the contracts and grants are being rewritten and prepared for Fiscal Year 1985. We are working towards continuation of existing programs and are writing new contracts attempting to provide more services for tribal members.

Upcoming is our "First Annual Siletz Indian Golf Tournament" being put together by our own Newsletter Editor, Ted Werth. If anyone is interested, please contact Ted Werth at 444-2536. There's still time to sign up. My son and I will both be there, and we hope to see you there also.

HUNTING & FISHING NOTICE

Starting this year Oregon State Game Officers will be checking tribal fishing and hunting licenses (Tribal ID cards) for a valid hunting and fishing sticker. Stickers will be issued to you when you receive your tag.

In the past those tribal members who were ruled ineligible because of past violations of the Tribal Hunting and Fishing Ordinance were able to use a tag issued to another tribal member. This was possible because even though validating stickers were issued by the Hunting and Fishing committee they weren't required or even checked by State Police.

This year however, at the request of the tribe, stickers will be checked by state game officers and those found without a valid sticker attached to the ID card will be treated as not having a valid license. If you are found in violation you will be cited accordingly.

The tribe has requested this of the State so that some form of control can be exercised over those who violate the Hunting and Fishing Ordinance as enforced by the Hunting and Fishing Committee.

Comprehensive Plan

In March, 1984, Tribal Council adopted an interim draft Comprehensive Plan. This plan outlines short and long range goals and objectives of the Tribe as a whole. Copies of the Plan are available at your local Area Office or can be obtained by writing to:
