Indian Child Welfare Training

On March 1, 1985, the Northwest Indian Child Welfare Institute (NWICWI) completed a series of workshops in which fourteen participants received instruction in training Indian child welfare workers. The participants were from eleven different tribes and Indian organizations in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho. Using a model curriculum, developed by NWICWI, the participants will now conduct training for Indian child welfare staff in their own tribe or organization. Some of the participants will also be available to provide training to other Indian child welfare programs in the Northwest. Each of the participants is Indian and each is currently working in Indian child welfare. This series of workshops was conducted over a six month period. Six three-day sessions were held at various reservations. Participants received instruction in Indian child welfare practice as well as in how to provide training.
