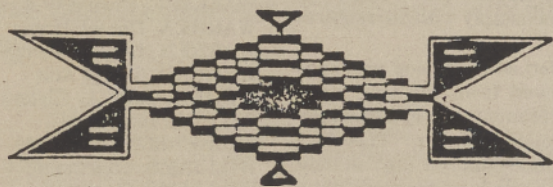

TUNA CASSEROLE

Decker Completes Summer Program

In the August 1985 issue of the Siletz Newsletter in an article titled "Working for Success", it was stated that Robert Gardner was a Siletz tribal member. This was thought to be incorrect by a number of people, but in fact is very true. Robert Decker is an enrolled Siletz tribal member and also goes by his mother's name of Gardner.

Robert Decker of Hoquiam, Washington, recently completed an expense-paid six-week summer institute in Portland, Oregon. Mr. Decker, who will be attending the University of Washington this fall, was selected to participate based on academic competence, interest in exploring the field of chiropractic, and potential for success in that profession. During the institute, Mr. Decker studied math, chemistry, biology, English composition, biculturalism, and an introductory course in chiropractic. This demanding academic schedule was balanced with an array of extra curricular activities including a traditional Indian pow-wow to honor summer institute graduates.

American Indians who have completed at least their junior year of high school are invited to apply for next summer's institute which will be scheduled for six weeks in July and August. Participants will be provided travel fare to and from Portland and per diem allowance for room, board, and incidentals. Funded by a grant from the Department of Health and Human Services, the program is sponsored by Western States Chiropractic College to offer chiropractic as a career option for American Indians. Young Scholars Needed

The National Endowment for the Humanities is looking for 50-75 young scholars who are interested in researching and writing about the U.S. Constitution.

Students who are interested are encouraged to apply. The students conduct their research under the guidance of a teacher or professor of the humanities.

The projects will involve full-time work for nine weeks next summer, and the encouragement will come in grants — \$1800 — \$2200 each. Topics must relate to the Constitution or the period in which it was written and adopted.
