**YOP/SYEP**

Summer Employment Programs for Indian youths are now in progress.

This summer the Siletz Tribe has a special YOP Program for youths who are Siletz Tribal Members. This program is only available in Siletz. The YOP Program is working on beautification projects and projects assisting Tribal Elders in the Siletz Area.

The YOP Leader for this year is Bonnie Miller. Working with Bonnie on the YOP Crew are the following, in alphabetical order:

Kelley Ellis, Shannon Hatch, Tracey Jackson, Jennifer Metcalf, Lisa Norton, Ronnie Oleman, Darrin Rilatos, Luella Simmons, Marci Simmons.

The JTPA Program also has a Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP), which serves eligible Native American youths of all tribes within the JTPA Program's eight county service area. There will be 14 positions in SYEP this summer. Because of the 10 YOP positions in Siletz, most of the 14 SYEP positions have been placed in the valley area.

Two SYEP youths are working in the Siletz Area of the JTPA Program, which includes Tillamook, Lincoln and Benton counties. One youth is doing clerical work in Siletz, and the other youth is working under the supervision of the Parks and Recreation Department in Corvallis.

The JTPA Salem Area serves Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties. Four youths are now working at various positions under SYEP in that area.

The Springfield Area of the SYEP Program serves Linn and Lane counties. There was a great demand for SYEP positions in Lane County this year. As the Program is attempting to serve as many youths as possible, the Springfield Area will be running a short program and serving eight youths with the funds available.

LAND ACQUISITION

NATURAL RESOURCES FROM MOTHER EARTH (THE HUMAN SIDE)

The Northern spotted owl, eagles, deer and elk roam the cathedral like forest that American Native Indians use for natural resources.

Women making baskets from spruce roots and hazel bush and using different kinds of tree bark for dying the colors of their baskets. Families out in their old chittum bark, picking fern, moss and berries. This is our heritage.

Let us not forget our little predators of the forest lands, the fish that travel their last dying days to spawn in the small streams that make their way through the timbered lands, and old snags that shelter the squirrels and provide a picnic area for the red headed and ivory bill woodpeckers.

Trees are not solely to be cut down and sold to the highest bidder, but to be closely monitored and cut the stands of timber called for. The unmerchantable wood products will be left at an easy accessible area for the elderly and the needy for firewood.

Roads are to be made in the right locations to combat soil erosion, leave buffer strips along streams to keep the water cool and clean for our fish to reproduce and the animals to get a cool, clean drink of water.

Those of you who worked in the woods or even took a stroll through the forest know how wonderful it is to lay down on your stomach and get a cool drink of water, then wipe your chin and lips off with your shirt sleeve. We, the Indian people of Mother Earth, know and understand these natural resources.

The land acquisition that we are asking for is something that we not only want but need, to support our economic development and share the load with jobs and economy for now and future generations to come.
