ELIGIBILITY CHANGES: The U.S. Appeals Court decision, Zarr vs. Barlow, eliminates the requirement that enrolled students be $\frac{1}{4}$ degree Indian blood to participate. In view of this, the Parent Committee moved and approved a resolution to update the Student List, adding "enrolled" members of federally recognized tribes, irregardless of their blood degree. 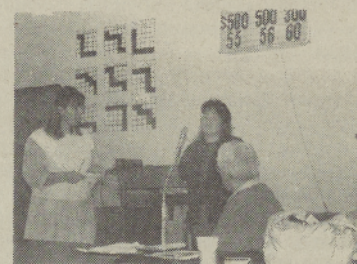
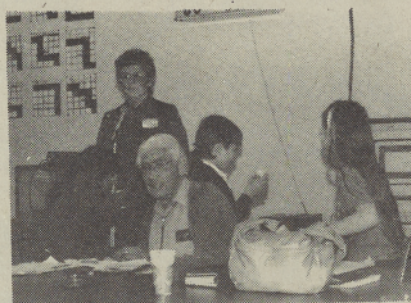

1987 Candidates' Fairs



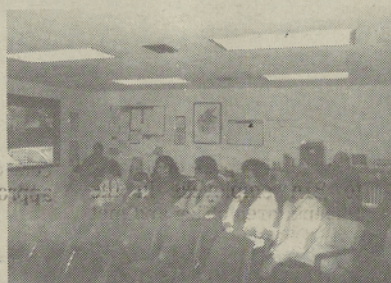
The 1987 Candidates Fairs that were held in each area this year were a big success. The fairs were well attended by Tribal members in each area.
