

Youths Earn Berths To State Wrestling Competition



A junior at Toledo High, Kent Rilatos in the heavy-weight division placed first in the Valco League with three consecutive pins. As a sophomore, Kent placed second to be selected as a member of the All-League Team.

Kent lettered in track, participating in shot-put.

Playing varsity football for three years, Kent was named to the 1986 Valco League First Team for defensive lineman. Also, earned honorable mention as offensive lineman and defensive linebacker.

Kent was selected to attend Indian Leadership Conference at Brigham Young University.

Kent was recently chosen to participate in April at Salem in the "4-H KNOW YOUR STATE GOVERNMENT" as a representative student for Indian Education, Title IV.

Kent is from Siletz and is the son of Manual and Clarice Rilatos.

Lee Butler, a senior at Toledo High School came in first at 123 pound weight class for the Valco League Wrestling Tournament which qualified him for the State Wrestling Tournament for AA schools. Lee also was chosen as outstanding wrestler for the Valco League. Stats for Lee were 26 wins with 21 of the wins on pins and 4 losses to end

his senior year. Lee came in second in his freshman year which qualified him to go to state wrestling. Lee also qualified for state in his sophomore year when he placed first in his weight class. Lee's junior year was a real disappointment for him, he broke his arm on third day of wrestling practice and was unable to wrestle but he came back in full force to end his high school wrestling with a first place win for the Valco League in his senior year.

Reggie Butler, a senior at Toledo High School qualified for the State Wrestling Tournament for AA schools at 130 pounds. Reggie upset the 2nd and 3rd seeded wrestlers in the final seconds of the rounds to place second at the Valco League Tournament. Stats for Reggie were 13 wins and 7 losses. This is Reggie's first and last year of wrestling. Reggie played basketball during his freshmen, sophomore and junior years, then decided to try wrestling in his senior year.

Earlier in the wrestling season, Reggie at 130 pounds and Lee at 123 pounds placed first in their weight division at the Rhododendron Tournament held at Florence, Oregon.

Reggie and Lee are from Siletz and are the twin sons of Reggie and Lillie Butler.

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MOTION #1 — Frank Simmons moved to approve the agenda with the addition of Executive Session after Approval of the Minutes. Seconded by Lori Johnson. Motion approved, 8-0-0.

Mary Alice asked that the minutes from the 12/20/86 Council Meeting be amended to include a statement that the cash award was in lieu of a 1.3½ cost-of-living increase. Tina will do this.

MOTION #2 — Bud Lane moved to approve the amended minutes of the 12/20/86 Council Meeting. Seconded by Frank Simmons. YES: Delores Pigsley, Frank Simmons, Mary Alice Muncey, Dolly Fisher, Art Bensell, Bud Lane, Alta Courville, Douglas Brown. NO: none. ABSTAIN: Lori Johnson. Motion approved, 8-0-1.

MOTION #3 — Bud Lane moved to enter Executive Session to discuss Personnel, 9:13 a.m. Seconded by Douglas Brown. Motion unanimously approved, 9-0-0.

MOTION #4 — Alta Courville moved to return to Regular Session, 10:25 a.m. Seconded by Lori Johnson. Motion unanimously approved, 9-0-0.

TRIBAL COUNCIL CONCERNS — Alta's concern was regarding a letter she received from Ed Ben regarding a list published in the tribal newsletter of people not returning their deer or elk tags. Ed and Rodney Ben's were on the list. Ed demanded the Council print a retraction; contact all 87 listed members to verify if they had returned their tags and take appropriate corrective action; review the policy that subjects tribal members to public ridicule without having an opportunity to be heard; and, publish his letter in the next tribal newsletter. Phil noted there was no malicious intent involved in publishing the list of names. Some people forget to return their tags. Dee suggested the Hunting & Fishing Committee look at the ordinance to see if there is an easier way to get information on the tags, or if we needed to return them or not. Ted said there wasn't anything in the State agreement requiring tribal members to return their tags, that it was something the State was asking the Tribe to do that they don't ask of others. A retraction will be printed in the next newsletter. Dee will write a letter to Edmond informing him of what the Council is doing. She asked that the Hunting & Fishing Committee bring their recommendations back at the February Council Meeting.

Mary Alice commended Phil on the fine job he did preparing the Council travel expense summary. She asked for more information on other tribal expenses. Phil noted that programs submit quarterly reports and he could make a copy available for Council members to view.

Dolly was concerned about the prepared questions for candidates during the Candidate Fairs. She felt some people are unfamiliar with what has happened with the Tribe and felt it was unfair to ask questions pertaining to tribal affairs. She felt the community should prepare the questions, not individuals. Bud also felt this way. Dee suggested it was up to the candidates to ask questions and become familiar with the Tribe if they want to run for Council. Tina mentioned that the Siletz community did discuss having questions for the candidate fairs at their Community Meeting and asked Denise Wilson and others to prepare them. Frank felt there were questions asked at the Candidates Fair that should be asked at General Council. Dee also noted that Tribal Council members are asked questions at any given time, and need to be prepared. Dolly asked why the Council no longer approved payment for each monthly attorney's bill. Dee explained the Council has already approved up to a set amount for attorney fees. Dolly asked if STEDCO has purchased the apartments in Siletz and a couple of blocks of land in town. Ted noted they had. Council asked for STEDCO minutes. Dee noted they didn't always have a monthly meeting, but could provide the Council with a monthly report on STEDCO activities. Ted will take care of this. Ted was selected as STEDCO Executive Director. Council asked for a Housing Authority report, also. Dolly asked if the Security staff were using their own vehicle. They are using tribal vehicles since they have a radio in them. In either case, the same cost is charged against their program, whether they use tribal vehicles or their own. Dolly asked if STEDCO pays for part of security salaries since they patrol around the apartments. They do not. Bud asked if STEDCO could occasionally hold meetings on the weekends in Siletz in order for more people to attend. Frank asked about the reserve fund. Dee explained that we do not have a reserve fund yet, that it will be created with the accelerated cut. It has not been determined what will happen with it yet. The planning session will help Council members make a decision. Ted noted John Gray suggested they get a money manager. Phil scheduled a meeting with some previously, but the Council was not able to meet with them then. Frank asked about Ross Swimmer. Susan Harjo talked about trying to get rid of him, but nothing has happened. Dee read a portion of a letter from NCAI on Ross Swimmer's report on BIA schools being contracted out. Dee felt we should register our concern by writing to our Congressional leaders. She also suggested that we draft a letter for a mass mailing by tribal members to send to the Congressional leaders and Senate Select Committees. Frank asked what would happen to the Planner position since Ted has been hired as Executive Director. STEDCO is not going to fill this position in order to save money. Any needed technical expertise can be hired with the funds saved by not hiring a permanent planner. Phil mentioned that in the TOEDP, the Planner was supposed to provide assistance to tribal members in putting together a funding application and work plans. This was removed from the TOEDP. Ted noted the Bureau was required to provide technical assistance to tribal members, but the Bureau says they are not. Ted said he would help when he could, but tribal members need to do their own business plans themselves or they wouldn't succeed in business. Phil felt that when tribal members work with federal programs it is difficult sometimes to understand what they require. Lori suggested STEDCO hold a workshop for tribal members to give them technical assistance with their work plans. Ted agreed to assist tribal members whenever possible. Douglas asked LeRoy the status of the tribal member needing an operation. LeRoy sent a letter and release form to the tribal member's doctor requesting a report on the medical need. The doctor has not sent the report yet, and LeRoy is unable to write to Dr. Nurre until he receives it. LeRoy agreed to contact the tribal member's doctor again. Dee noted that we had not received any more information on the USDA service expansion appeal. Forest Gerard called, but he wasn't able to get additional information. Dee received a commemorative medal and the pen which Governor Atiyeh signed the State/Tribal ICWA Agreement with. She would like the Historian to check into obtaining a locking display case to put these in. Dee ask-

credited program for an MD or DO degree.

Health Education — Masters level.

Chemical Dependency Counseling — Masters level.

MEETING: Regular Tribal Council Meeting

DATE: January 17, 1987

TIME: 9:00 a.m.

PLACE: Siletz Tribal Community Center

Chairman, Delores Pigsley, called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m. Roll call was taken with 7 council members present and 2 absent. Mary Alice entered the meeting at 9:08 a.m., Douglas entered at 9:10 a.m.
