

Summer Youth Employment Program

We are looking for a few excellent youths who are 14 or older!

The Siletz JTPA Program will have a small Summer Youth Employment Program, (SYEP), this year which is funded through JTPA by the United States Department of Labor. Participants cannot begin work until July 1st because of the funding source. The Program will run from July 1, 1987 through August 31, 1987, and will have positions for twelve (12) youths enrolled six (6) hours per day at federal minimum wage.

SYEP youths will be placed throughout the eight county Siletz JTPA service area in various locations. We regret that no SYEP funds are allocated by the Department of Labor to the tri-county Portland area, as the Department of Labor does not give SYEP funds to urban JTPA Native American Programs. As a result, the Urban Indian Council JTPA Program in Portland does not receive SYEP monies. Indian youths in the tri-county Portland area who are interested in SYEP should contact the state run JTPA Program in their county.

Various types of employment with public or non-profit employers are available to youths through SYEP, such as clerical work, manual work, etc. Eligibility must follow JTPA regulations, including economically disadvantaged household income. All youths under the age of 18 must also have an Oregon Work Permit, and live within the eight county Siletz JTPA service area.

If you, or a youth in your family, are interested in this Program, please contact JTPA staff in the nearest tribal office. An intake for JTPA must be completed, and if you are under 18 years of age your parent or guardian must sign giving permission for you to participate in the Program.

Salem, Springfield and Siletz JTPA staff will begin taking Summer Youth intakes on May 20, 1987. Please contact JTPA staff for an appointment for an intake. No appointments will be available on Friday, May 22, 1987.

We expect to fill the SYEP Program quickly, so phone now if you are interested.

Youth Opportunity Program (YOP)

The Confederated Tribes of Siletz will have a Youth Opportunity Program this summer, which is funded through the Bureau of Indian Affairs. There will be an eight (8) member Crew and a Project Leader. Only Siletz Tribal Members are eligible for this Program, and the Program will be conducted only in the Siletz area.

The YOP Crew will perform groundskeeping improvements on Government Hill, maintain tribal cemeteries, assist Tribal Members and Elders with clean-up and yard projects and assist in construction, development and clean-up at the annual Siletz Pow Wow.

Please read the job descriptions and requirements for Crew Worker and Project Leader. If you are interested, application instructions are as follows:

Application Forms and assistance with copying work permits will be available in the Central Office on Government Hill beginning May 18th. However, no applications will be accepted until Tuesday, May 26, 1987.

All applicants for YOP Positions must present:

1. a Tribal Application Form, including date of birth; and,
2. a Parental Consent Form if you are under 18 years of age; and,
3. a copy of your Oregon Work Permit if you are under 18 years of age.

Hand in completed applications beginning Tuesday, May 26, 1987 at Central Office on Government Hill in Siletz.

APPLICATIONS WILL BE DATE STAMPED BY CENTRAL OFFICE STAFF ON GOVERNMENT HILL IN SILETZ, IN THE ORDER IN WHICH THEY ARE RECEIVED.

All applications will be checked with Tribal Enrollment to verify Tribal Membership prior to acceptance in the YOP Program.

Last year there were more YOP applications than positions. If you are serious about entering the YOP Program, turn in your application on May 26th. Applications will be considered in the order in which they are received.

YOP CREW WORKER: (8 positions)

Dates of Employment: July 6, 1987 through August 14, 1987, six (6) hours per day.

Wage: \$3.35 per hour

Working Hours: 8 A.M. to 3 P.M.

Work Site: Government Hill, Siletz Tribal Offices and Tribal Elder's homes in Siletz area.

Job Duties: Work on community clean-up, conservation and beautification projects as assigned, and attend training session on career awareness.

Supervision: Reports directly to Project Leader, but must also take direction from the Business Manager.

Minimum Qualifications:

1. Must be a student currently enrolled in school; and,
2. Must be between the ages of 14 through 21; and,
3. Must be a Siletz Tribal Member.

YOP PROJECT LEADER:

Dates of Employment: June 29, 1987 through August 21, 1987, six (6) hours per day.

Wage: \$4.10 per hour

Working Hours: 8 A.M. to 3 P.M.

Work Site: Government Hill, Siletz Tribal Offices and Tribal Elder's homes in Siletz

Job Duties: Organizes and supervises crew members, develops job sites, purchases required tools, prepare work schedules, prepare time and mileage reports, monitor attendance, organize career awareness training session for crew members, and prepare final narrative report.

Responsibilities: To work in a safe, responsible manner, to maintain a polite, courteous manner with community members, to supervise youth crew, prepare required reports, monitor expenditures, ensure cooperative and friendly relations between crew and community.

Minimum Qualifications:

1. High School Diploma or equivalent, or related experience; and,
2. Possess a valid Oregon Driver's License; and,
3. Be between the ages of 18 through 21; and,
4. Be an enrolled Siletz Tribal Member.
