Tribal Forestry Department working on Environmental Assessment/Management Plan

The Tribal Forestry Department has begun work on the Environmental Assessment and Management Plan for the 3,582 acres of commercial forest land. The Environmental Assessment will identify and address issues and concerns relating to forestry activities. Several meetings will be held with the Special Interest Groups and area offices to identify the concerns of the Siletz Tribal people. The management plan will determine the annual allowable cut and regulate timber harvest for a 10 year period. Watch for notices of upcoming meetings.

We landed at Manchester, took a bus to Liverpool to spend 2 days. We also went by bus to London. Along with the odd deal of driving on the "wrong side" on the road, had to adjust to being 8 hours ahead of the time here.

Our peers we met there all thought American kids are rich, rich cause we have our own cars to drive. Yet any street you looked at were lots of Jaquars. I thought the food was lousy there. Everything was very expensive. In the English newspaper I bought, I noticed is not all the advertizing like in our papers. Articles though read like ours here as "how can young couples buy their first homes," the subject of AIDS, and financial struggles of the elderly.

Our tours included Big Ben, House of Parliament, viewing of the Crown Jewels, place guard, Piccadilly Circus, Tower of London, Trafalgar Square, Bank of England,

etc. My favorites were the old, old cathedrals, the architecture and the stained glass windows.. They were awesome. About the England-Oregon Classic football games we played, Oregon won by big scores. It would be like putting us against their rugby team. The British need to learn fundamentals of football yet. They have a few different rules, like you can't advance a fumble. It was a great experience. My first time abroad and so far away from home. I'll never forget it.

Council Explores Joint Venture

Shoshone-Bannock tribal officials have been meeting with a Northwest construction company to discuss a possible joint venture.

Blaze Construction co., of Yakima, Wash., has expressed an interest in joining with the tribes to provide structural and road construction services. Blaze is one of the largest Indian -owned construction companies in the nation. The company boasts of over 200 permanent employees and three regional offices in the western United States. It is owned by Bill H. Aubrey, of Blackfeet descent.

Fort Hall Business Council Chairman Marvin Osborne believes a joint venture with Blaze could be an opportunity to reactivate the tribal construction department to provide jobs for tribal members. He envisions the joint venture enabling the tribes to bid on construction projects they and Blaze Construction deem as profitable for both entities.
