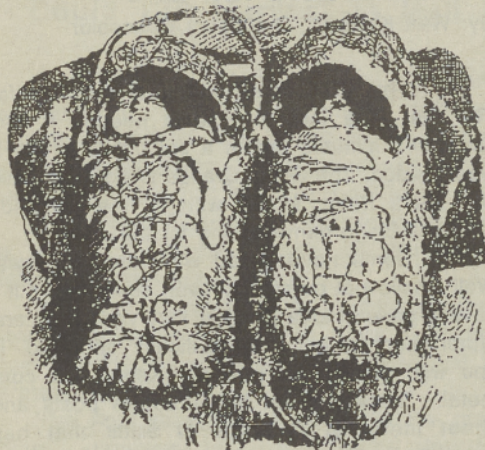


Birth Announcements

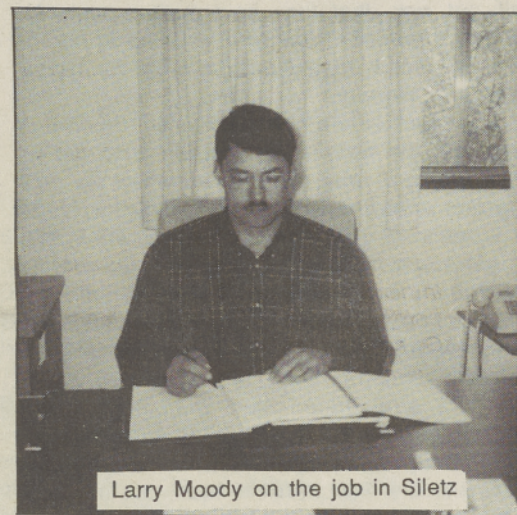
