The Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians is requesting proposals for the Architectural and Engineering services for the planned 4,000 sq. ft. expansion of the Siletz Community Health Clinic located in Siletz, Oregon.

The A/E Services include the preparation and submission of the project design, plans, specifications, construction contract documents, and detailed cost estimates.

The above two proposals can be submitted under one cover, but each project must have a separate proposal.

Indian owned companies will be given preference to the extent feasible. Companies claiming Indian Preference must furnish adequate proof of Indian Ownership with the proposal to be considered.

American Indian Week

On May 13, 1993 Governor Roberts signed the following Proclamation designating May 16-22 as American Indian Week.

WHEREAS: The old ones among the American Indians tell of a wondrous time when the People stood in the middle of the magic circle and all about them was abundance and life; and

WHEREAS: With the passing of the seasons, others came and they were greedy and they heedlessly inflicted grievous wounds upon the sacred Mother through their ignorance and thoughtlessness; and

WHEREAS: With reverence for the past embodied in their ageless songs and stories, the People continue to believe that from grace and harmony can come new life; and

WHEREAS: The native people's vision builds hope for a healing and time when the creatures return and there are again lush forests, sparkling waters, sweet air and an unmatched quality of life.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Barbara Roberts, Governor of the State of Oregon, hereby proclaim May 16-22, 1993, as

AMERICAN INDIAN WEEK

in Oregon in celebration of the wisdom of our Indian people whose faith renews our spirit and encourages our tomorrow.

What I Like About The Tribe

On the cover of the March edition of the Sovereign Nations magazine was a large photo of a scene from the Siletz Pow-Wow with the caption, "Siletz; The Comeback Tribe." This publication is put out by the Tribal Self-Governance Demonstration Project. Evidently, the phenomenal growth and vitality of the Siletz Tribe has not gone without notice. The article likened the Siletz to a downed boxer who somehow manages to get up and fight on to victory.

Restoration was just the biggest of what has turned out to be a series of comebacks to greater autonomy and independence. By nearly all standards, be it number of programs, cultural activities, numbers employed by the Tribe, socio-economic levels of Tribal members, etc., the Tribe is prospering. One example was that recently the student gathering honored 14 members graduating from college or vocational training.

At a recent manager's meeting, the 1984 Comprehensive Plan was reviewed. That plan outlined eight areas of Tribal needs. In order of priority, the areas included economical development, education and training, natural resource management, cultural heritage, health care, housing, communications, and recreation. Each category had several objectives. With few exceptions, the Tribe had at least minimally accomplished what it set out to do. This doesn't mean that more can't be done, but these achievements are certainly a tribute to the desire and resourcefulness of the Tribe.

Community meetings are being scheduled to update the comprehensive plan and address other issues. This is a important opportunity to have input and contribution on where the Tribe goes in the next several years. I strongly encourage you to attend these meetings.

I fully expect Siletz's comeback to be talked about for a long time. This can only happen as the Tribe and its individual members continue to push for improvement and not staying down when dealt a setback. One definition of success is getting up one more time than being knocked down. Whether the issue is gaming, Tribal, or whatever, I see no indication that setbacks are going to be taken lying down.
