We hope that many Tribal members have been able to see the progress that is being made on the apartments along Logsden Road. Those who will be occupying these apartments are being sent notification letters and copies of the leases for their review. Not all of the units have been assigned at this time. We are still in the process of screening applicants and making decisions on selections.

We are now beginning the planning of our next housing area, which the Tribal Council has decided will be up on Judd Road. Our architect and I walked over this area last week and this will indeed be a beautiful site for additional housing units. It is close to the Tribal Community Center and will be adjacent to recreational facilities, such as the baseball field and additional playground areas that could be developed as a part of this new project. It is also feasible that part of this area could be developed for parking for both ballfield use and Pow Wow use, which is what this area has traditionally been used for. My goal is to get this project under construction by next summer. It will add another 25 or so rental units to our housing stock--units for singles, couples, small families, including Elders and those of other age groups.

**Siletz River Community Development Corporation**

In the past year, Siletz River Community Development Corporation, located in Siletz, has developed a subsidiary division called Siletz River Farms which began in the summer of 1994. This subdivision has incubated several new businesses among which are a Native American crafts line; a Production Nursery located adjacent to the Siletz Tribal Forest Products Mill in Toledo; and a Landscape contracting business.

These businesses employ tribal members and other low income Lincoln County residents. The crafts are currently being marketed at the Abilities, Etc. giftshop in Lincoln City, Tillamook Cheese Factory giftshop, the Yaquina Bay Lighthouse giftshop, and the Oregon Coast Aquarium giftshop. Additional accounts are currently being established.

The Nursery operation is propagating native plants and a variety of landscape ornamentals to be used in the landscape operation and for the wholesale market.

In the landscaping business, a capable crew is busy installing new landscapes and renovating old landscapes in the Lincoln County area. This business also performs yard maintenance.
