The festival was provided at a total cost of \$300 which included the cost of 90 cases of pop, 1440 dixie cups of ice-cream, 22 lbs. of coffee, \$55 in prizes, and miscellaneous items. This cost is shared by the 14 chapters in District No. 2, prorated to their membership.

This first festival is planned as an annual affair and might be scrutinized by other Districts as a means of promoting interest in their districts. It proved highly successful and of true worth in bringing State employees in closer contact with the OSEA and its activities in their behalf.
