Two career employees of the State have been selected as first recipients of University of Oregon fellowships, providing a year of graduate study in political and social sciences, it was announced jointly by Governor Holmes and University President, Meredith Wilson.

Robert E. Stevens, of Dallas, Assistant Purchasing Agent with the Department of Finance and Administration, and a member of VAFA Chapter No. 69, and William Paul Holtsclaw, District Forest Warden for the Northwest Unit at Forest Grove, a member of N. W. Forestry Chapter

The fellowships, provided by the Ford Foundation and the University, total about \$4000 each. The winners were selected by a five-man screening board, and are also eligible to receive up to half of their monthly salaries during the period of study.
