DISTRICT NO. 1

A dearth of chapter meeting reports from District 1 predicated our style this issue . . . we shall group all reports under District headings with appropriate chapter mention. ROSE CITY CHAPTER 5 reports progress in its public service project of collecting tools and trading stamps for the Portland Children's Center. Other chapters were invited to participate at the December Presidents' Council.

DISTRICT NO. 2

District 2 is considering a number of public service projects, among them the furnishing of a hospital room and the replacement of trees in the Capitol Mall blown down by the Columbus Day Storm. Other suggestions are being made, and the District Presidents' Council expects to arrive at a suitable solution shortly.

SALEM CHAPTER 1 is submitting the most comprehensive chapter meeting reports yet received by the News. All committees have been appointed by President Carl Vistica and are functioning. The meetings appear to include all the constructive elements that make this Association grow in prestige and awareness of its obligations and privileges.

SIAC CHAPTER 20 will replace its great "Broadcaster" with a monthly publication. (This should be of great advantage to the membership from the standpoint of timeliness - Ed.) In the public service area, the chapter will participate in the proposed District 2 hospital project; distributed food in a can-do project; donated \$40 to the BSA.

FORESTRY CHAPTER 25 in its most recent report obtained 20 new members by having group representatives make contacts with all non-members in office.

DMV CHAPTER 86 has contributed \$100 to the 1963 Scholarship fund.

DISTRICT NO. 4

OTI CHAPTER 36 has appointed a welfare committee to look after members who might become ill and need financial assistance. (The insurance representative might push the Income Protection Plan as one solution to this problem - Ed.) More social functions have been suggested, as well as the prospect of changing the Chapter By-Laws. Past-President Joe Lovell is leaving State service for health reasons, one year before his expected retirement. A special event is planned to wish him God speed. Joe has been with the State since 1952.

DISTRICT NO. 5

BAKER CHAPTER 37 voted to ratify the amendment to Article VII of the OSEA Constitution. Also voted was a \$20 contribution to the OSEA Scholarship Fund. Under discussion were meeting attendance and the possibility of sponsoring a Little League Baseball team to strengthen community relations.

DISTRICT NO. 6

CORVALLIS CHAPTER 29 will hold alternating noon and evening meetings hereafter. It voted down the proposed amendment to Article VII of the OSEA Constitution and reported building a movable bookcase to present fully stocked to Corvallis' Good Samaritan Hospital.

EUGENE CHAPTER 6 lost Vice-President William Crouch, who moved to Oregon City. Elected to fill out the unexpired term was Ray Hanson of Creswell.

DISTRICT NO. 8

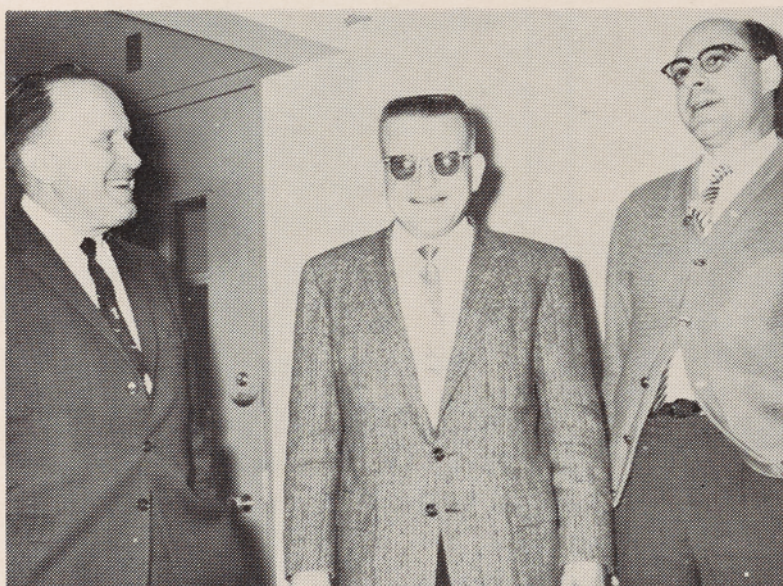
