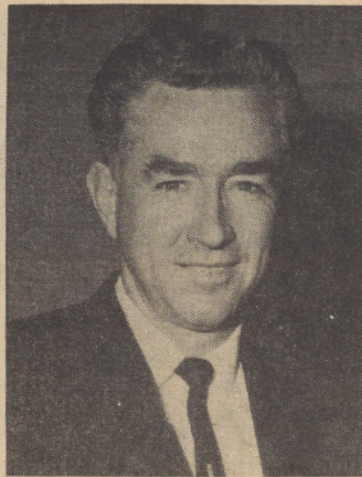

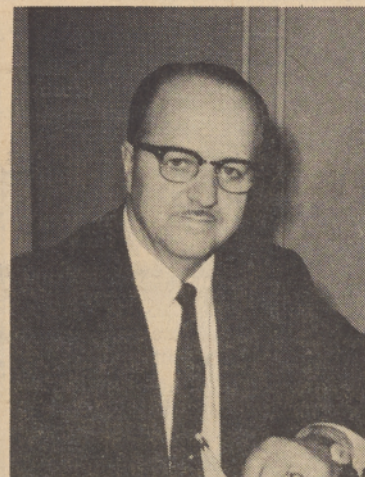

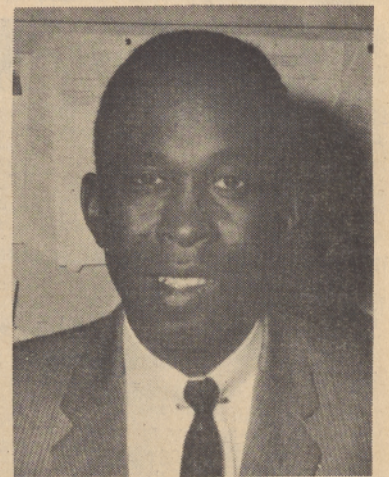

## 3 Tax Commission Employees Leave To Establish African Withholding Tax System

Three veteran income tax auditors employed by the State Tax Commission have taken two-year leaves of absence to serve as tax consultants to African governments.

Clarence W. Brown and Benjamin C. Webb, both members of Multnomah Income Tax Chapter 53 in Portland, and Braden Daggett, a charter member of Marion Chapter 18 in Salem will spend two years in Africa under contract with the U. S. Aid for International Development program.

### 19 - Year Veteran

Brown, a 19-year veteran with the Tax Commission, has been manager of the income division's district office in Oregon City.

He will serve as chief of the audit section of the Bureau of Internal Revenue for the government of Liberia. His new job includes the responsibility of establishing a system of tax audit.

The purpose of the program, Brown said, is to help provide Liberia, which has adequate tax laws, with an effective means of collecting revenue and enforcing its tax laws.

### Will Live In Monrovia

Liberia, which is located in Western Africa near the Ivory Coast, is the oldest Negro republic in Africa, and second only to Haiti in the world.

Accompanied by his wife and three of his sons, he will live in the capital city of Monrovia, which is a seaport of about 80,000

population. Monrovia was named after President James Monroe, and the name Liberia came from the fact that the original settlers were liberated from white slavers.

According to Brown, Liberia has only two seasons, the rainy season and the dry season. Although it is not too hot, the humidity is high much of the time. Brown said happily that both his home and office will be air-conditioned.

### Training Officers

Both Daggett, a corporation audit supervisor and a 20-year employee of the Tax Commission, and Webb, a nine-year employee who has been an auditor in the Portland office, will serve as training officers for the East African Common Services Organization.

EACSO manages tax, tariff and other fiscal matters for the African governments of Uganda, Kenya and Tanzania. The organization is headed by nine commissioners, three from each country.

### Cosmopolitan City

Both men will live and work in Dar es Salaam, an Arab trading port on the Indian Ocean. A cosmopolitan city, it has a population of 130,000 and is located in Tanzania.

Since the country is located only 400 miles south of the equator, the climate is hot and the humidity is very high. Webb remarked that he and Daggett will arrive just in time for the rainy season to begin.

### British Civil Servants

Webb and Daggett will be responsible for training new employees to replace the British civil servants who are retiring. They will also be responsible for establishing a withholding tax system.

Under the old British tax system, Africans fill out their tax forms and send them in, but do not compute them. Until each form is examined individually, the taxpayer does not know how much tax he has to pay. Taxes do not have to be paid until 18 months after the return is filed.

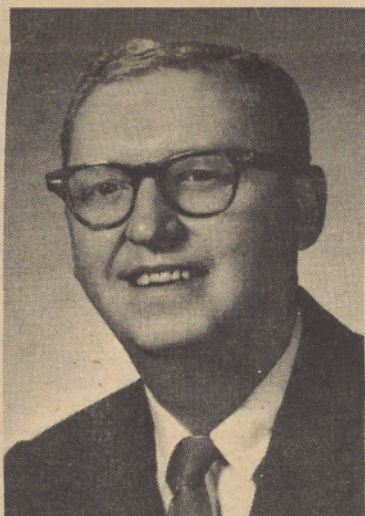
### Second Trip

This will be the second leave of absence to work for a foreign government for Daggett. From 1957 to 1959 he was a fiscal advisor to the Ministry of Interior for the government of Iran.

All three men will be on their new jobs by May 1.

## Two OSEA Members Enter Salem School Board Race

Two OSEA member, one a two-term past-president of the association, have announced their candidacy for positions on the Salem School Board. They are Gerald F. Bartz, 2220 Emmett Drive N.W., and Darryl E. Storm, 117 Idylwood Drive, S. E.

Bartz, a member of Marion Chapter 18, has been an Assistant Attorney General for the State Tax Commission for the past seven years.

From 1947 to 1952 he was resident officer or military governor in Bavaria with the U. S. Department of State. Among his duties was the reorientation and supervision of teachers in primary and secondary schools.

He was in private practice in Portland for several years before joining the Tax Commission in 1958. Bartz was the legal advisor to the Citizens Conference for Governmental Cooperation, the massive cooperation study which earned an "All America" award for Salem and Marion and Polk Counties and established the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments.

He has worked with the YMCA and United Good Neighbor fund drives. He and his wife, Jeanene, have two children.

Storm, a member of Forestry

Chapter 25, served as president of OSEA in 1961-62. He is employed by the State Forestry Department as Finance Director. He has been with the department for the past 18 years.

Long active in OSEA, Storm has served in various offices including vice-president, director of insurance, chapter president and long-time delegate to General Council.

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
