

OSEA's Corvallis Chapter Honors Margaret Foster, Marvin Doleman

OSEA's Corvallis Chapter 29 honored two of its hard-working members--Margaret Foster and Marvin Doleman--at its annual family picnic July 28.

More than 300 members, families and friends of the chapter gathered in Avery Park to enjoy the "potluck picnic" plus chicken and beverages supplied by the chapter.

The "Member of the Year" award, originated by Social Chairman William Plemmons last year as a feature of the picnic, was given to Margaret Foster. She received a plaque and certificate designed by Plemmons and will receive a patio planter for her "faithful and dedicated service to OSEA as Chapter 29's Membership Secretary for many years."

In making the presentation, Plemmons pointed out the seriousness with which Margaret approached her responsibility during the past several years. He said she spent many days of work on the membership records and reports of OSEA's largest chapter.

Special recognition and a fuschia plant were presented to Marvin Doleman of the OSU Physical Plant. Each year on the day of the picnic he goes to Avery Park between 1:00 and 2:00 a.m. to secure the most desirable location in the park.

CSC Chairman Orloff Resigns

Monford Orloff, chairman of the Civil Service Commission, has resigned after nearly four years as a member of the commission.

Gov. Tom McCall had not yet named his successor as this issue of the NEWS went to press.

In a letter to Orloff, OSEA Executive Secretary Thomas C. Enright thanked him for his "outstanding service" to the commission and state employees.

"We feel that you have done a wonderful job as a member, and especially as chairman of the commission," Enright said.

"Although we could not expect under the circumstances that you would accept another full term," Enright said, "we have wondered whether you could be persuaded to stay for a shorter time, perhaps six months or a year."

"I am sure Gov. McCall would agree with us that there would be real benefit to the State of Oregon and its employees if you could see fit to do so," Enright said.

Orloff, who is president and chairman of the board of Evans Products Company, told Enright that the growth of the company and the increasing demands on his time made it impossible to continue as a commission member.

"When I agreed to take the appointment some four years ago, I did so with the understanding that I would serve not more than one term," he said.

Orloff said it was a privilege to have been a member of the commission, and to have worked with the "very fine people who have a real interest in the better functioning of our state government, and particularly, the excellent employees who carry out the administration of our government."

Park Ranger 2 Class Started

The Civil Service Commission established a new classification of Park Ranger 2 at its meeting last month.

The new job was created as the result of joint action by some park employees in Southern Oregon, the Highway Department and OSEA.

Work on the classification began a full year ago when the suggestion was made by an OSEA chapter in Medford, Highway personnel officers and

OSEA staff members met with groups of employees in that and other areas of the state concerning the matter.

In a letter to staff member Edward L. Wilson, Gene Huntley, Highway personnel director, said, "We believe it is a real accomplishment to get this established and that over a period of time it will work to the advantages of our operations and to the men concerned."

Golf Tournament Near; Plan To Enter Now

OSEA members planning to enter the association's fifth annual golf tournament have less than two weeks left in which to mail their entry forms to headquarters.

Tournament Chairman Chalmers Jones urged members to mail entry forms and fees as soon as possible so that final arrangements can be made with the golf club.

The tournament will be held at the Salem Golf Club on South River Road on Saturday, August 17.

The entry fee is \$6.00. Of that amount, \$4.00 will be used to pay green fees and \$2.00 will go towards the cost of prizes and refreshments.

The entry fee for members of the Salem Golf Club is \$2.00.

The tournament will begin at 7:00 a.m. A foursome will be started every seven minutes. Players will be informed of their starting times by mail.

Players will be divided into six flights. Flight placement will be determined by gross

score. Net scores will be used to determine flight winners.

As in past years a "blind bogey" system of scoring will be used.

The Tournament Committee will pre-select four handicap holes. Players will not be informed of the holes until after they have completed their rounds.

Eighty-three per cent of the strokes over par on the handicap holes will be subtracted from the gross scores to determine the net scores.

A picnic lunch will be served on the golf course next to the ninth hole at the conclusion of the tournament.

Winner of the championship flight will have his name inscribed on the Governor's Trophy, a perpetual trophy donated by former Governor Mark O. Hatfield and kept on display at OSEA headquarters.

Last year's tournament drew some 60 players from all areas of the state. Floyd Baxter won the championship flight.

Tournament Rules

The following regulations will be in force for the fifth annual OSEA golf tournament:

FLAG STICK: Players may use the flag stick while shooting from the fairway. They may not, however, use the flag stick from any place on the green.

OUT OF BOUNDS: The penalty for out of bounds will be stroke and distance. In the event of doubt, a provisional ball should be hit.

PUTTING: Once a player has putted, he must continue putting until he has holed out. In the event putting would cause him to tread on the line of another player, he may, on request, mark his ball and putt later.
