

One Incumbant Defeated In OSEA's District Elections

Unofficial results of OSEA's nine district elections show one incumbent director was defeated in his bid for re-election as five new directors were elected and four incumbents re-elected for one-year terms.

The upset occurred in District Four where Harry J. Marshall, Klamath Falls Chapter 12, defeated two-term incumbent director Paul N. Conner, a member of OTI Chapter 36. Marshall is employed by the Department of Forestry and Conner works for Oregon Technical Institute.

Four other new directors were elected in Districts One, Five, Six and Nine. Only one was opposed. He is Donald A. Martin, Success Chapter 30, who defeated David D. Saunders, Beaver Chapter 31, for director of District One.

The other three newly elected directors who ran unopposed are Delbert C. Chaney, District Five, Wilhelmina E. Bevers, District Six, and Walter S. Schmidt, District Nine.

Four incumbent directors, all of whom ran unopposed, were re-elected. They include James J. Kinns, District Two, Russell E. Blair, District Three, Lee Roy R. Ryan, District Seven, and Carey J. Huckaba, District Eight.

Only three of the nine races for assistant director positions were contested, and only one incumbent lost. In District Two, Jack R. Dawson, Oregon Oregon Chapter 22, defeated Blessing M. Proctor, VAFA Chapter 69, and Roger D. Thomson, Marion Chapter 18, in a three-candidate race. In District Five, Norman M. Kerr, Blue Mountain Chapter 94, edged Joseph R. Roche, Pendleton Chapter 52. And in District Seven, Betty Wolff, Oregon Trail Chapter 35, defeated two-term incumbent Charles A. Bohannon, a member of River Bend Chapter 14.

The six assistant directors who ran unopposed are Jackie E. Setti, District One, Marian Lahr Hagle, District Three, Charles E. Bryant, District Four, N. W. Pratt, District Six, Ray P. Karpen, District Eight, and Jeanette A. Simpson, District Nine.

Cheryl Williams Named Researcher

Cheryl Williams, an OSEA staff secretary since November, 1971, has been promoted to research analyst. All 18 district officers will be sworn into office at the close of the 1972 General Council. The nine directors will be members of OSEA's 1972 Board of Directors along with 10 other officers who will be elected by delegates at the convention.

Both the "variable annuity" portion of the account (which is invested in common stocks and short term notes) and the "fixed" portion of the account (which is invested in long term bonds and mortgages) are listed. The table shows the value of each \$100 invested in either the variable annuity or fixed account on the date listed.
