CALIFORNIA FIELD DAY.

The ninth annual inter-collegiate field
meet between the teams of Stanford uni-
versity and the University of California,
was held at Palo Alto on the 21st inst.
The honors of the day went to the
wearers of the blue and gold, who took
ten first places out of a possible thirteen
and closed the meet with a score of 84
points to their opponents 33.

Woolsey (U. C.) was the star of the
day. He won the half mile, the 220 yd
hurdle, the high jump and took second
place in the shot put, making a total of
17 points.

Plaw (U. C.) won both the weight
events, smashing the coast record in the
hammer throw. Drum, the fast Berkeley
sprinter won the 220 and 440 yd dashes
but was beaten in the hundred by Mc-
Caughern, a Stanford freshman. Cadog-
an the California freshman, upon whom
the wearers of the blue and gold had
based their strongest hopes proved a fail-
ure as he scored points only in the 220 yd
sprint. Stewart, the Stanford sprinter
also disappointed his admirers and Nar-
amore the Palo Alto hurdler was easily
defeated by the Californians.

Some of the records made in the above
mentioned meet were poor, but the cold-
ness of the day was probably largely
accountable for such poor performances.
5 or 2-5 in the mile run: 5 ft 3½
in in the high jump and 55 1-5 in the quar-
ter does not speak well for such institu-
tions as California and Stanford. Some
of the performances were good, but as a
whole they were not up to the standard
of those of the Oregon inter-collegiate
association.
