BERKELEY'S EASTERN TOUR.

BERKELEY, April 24.—The athletes of the University of California, comprising the pick of all its material, will start next Friday evening on their trip East. Probably nine men will go, besides Manager Ezra W. Decoto and Trainer George Hufferdine. They plan to be gone a little over a month, returning to California about June 8th. Their examinations will be given to them specially before they start, and as the spring term ends on the day of their departure, the work of their college year will have been completed. Seven men are sure of going on the journey. They are Captain William P. Drum, sprinter; Albert D. Plaw, hammer-thrower; Anthony Cadogan, sprinter; Roy Woolsey, runner, hurdler, jumper and all-around man; Ben Bakewell, hurdler; J. D. Hoffman, pole vaulter, and as the seventh man either Coleman R. Broughton, broad jump; or Charles K. Moser, mile runner. The chances are that both these men will be taken, but if either is left behind, it will be the one whose chances for winning on Eastern fields is considered to be the least. The absence of either will be a serious loss to the team, as it would result in losing one contest by default in every meet. The ninth man is Albert M. Walsh, the mile walker, who will go to Chicago for the Western Inter-collegiate meet, where the walk is still retained as an event. Walsh will accompany the team on the rest of its trip, but not as a member. The discontinuance of the walk in Eastern track meets deprives the California team of one of its surest point winners. Manager Decoto has arranged five meets, with a prospect of making more matches after reaching the Atlantic coast. The first contest will be with Yale. Princeton and Pennsylvania will each be encountered in a dual meet, and the team will enter the Mott Haven games and the Western Intercollegiate at Chicago.

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
