Mr. Schafer, of the department of history, is perfecting a scheme to institute a great newspaper library which will eventually become historical in value. He will secure copies of every Oregon weekly paper and keep the files as they are printed, having the yearly volumes bound. In this way records of every section of Oregon will be kept intact. The value of such a collection will be recognized when we realize that not a vestige of official record now remains of various important events in Lane county prior to a very few years ago. Files of papers are destroyed and while we have no historians, it will be only a matter of time when the very events of today in Oregon will be questioned and failing of proof may be discarded as worthless. Mr. Schafer's idea carried out will certainly eliminate this danger. A similar library in every state university would be an innovation worthy to be sustained, and certainly would become valuable records in the future.
