A SPLENDID SHOWING.

Oregon Scores 42 Points Against California's Athletes.

To the unbounded admiration of the nine hundred people who saw the big inter state field meet yesterday, the University of Oregon scored 42 points against the California men. The meet was held in Bang's Park and it was the most successful athletic event ever pulled off in the state. The day was an ideal one and the track was hard and fast. Two Pacific Coast records were broken. The first when Powell, of California, ran over the course in the low hurdle in 25 2-5 seconds and the other when Cado-gan did the 220 dash in 22 flat. Heater's work in the high hurdle race and Cado-gan's "even time" in the 100 yard dash equalled the coast inter collegiate records while Wagner's discus throw and Smith's shot put broke the local college figures. In the running broad jump, Hussey, of California, won with a leap of 22 feet, 5 1/2 inches; Heater took second with 21 feet, 11 inches to his credit and Cheek third, with a jump of 21 feet, 5 1/2 inches. All three performances beat the P. N. A. record held by Bert Kerrigan.

The Oregon team was not in the best of condition, for Palmer and Redmond were in wretched shape and Knox, the gritty little jumper, did not compete at all. However, the 'varsity is proud of its men, especially, since they scored ten more points against Berkeley than Stanford was able to roll up.
