Chemical Seminar.

At the meeting of the Chemical Semi-
nar Monday evening, Dr. Lachman and
Mr. Stafford gave some interesting ex-
periments with the projection spectro-
scope. This instrument is in principle
like the common spectroscope used in
laboratories but in mechanism differs
from it in the use of an electric arc as
the source of light and the spectrum, in
this case is cast upon a screen. The
spectrum of the lithium, copper, stron-
tium, sodium and other metals were
given. The characteristic lines of each
metal were plainly visible and the uses
made of these lines in recognizing met-
als were explained. The absorption
power of colored solutions and, also,
colored glass was shown by placing the
the different substances in the path of
the light. Each absorbed characteristic
colors of the spectrum, thus producing
dark bands where the colors had been
absorbed. The spectroscope is used for
experimental work on the border-lands
of physics and chemistry.

Seminar of Education.

Dr. J. A. Beattie, of the Weston Nor-
mal, addressed the students of the Uni-
versity last Tuesday evening on "The
Need of Education in the United States."
In this talk the speaker pointed out the
responsibilities of the teacher. He said
that every American child has a right
to the inheritance which literature,
science, history, taste and art confer on
one. There are four things that influ-
ence human destiny: heredity, natural
endowment, formal instruction, and en-
vironment. He then urged on teachers
the necessity of taking every possible
advantage of formal instruction and en-
vironment in order to place before the
student those advantages which would
prepare them for the responsibilities of
an active and useful life.
