

Stanford-California Meet.

The annual track-meet between the University of California and Stanford University was won by the former by a score of 78½ to 43½. Three coast intercollegiate records were broken, one was tied and two new ones established. The records for the various events were as follows:

Mile Run—4 minutes, 43½ seconds; 100-yard dash, 10 1-5 seconds; 120-yard hurdle, 16 1-5 seconds; hammer throw, 153 feet, 10½ inches; high jump, 5 feet 8½ inches; shot put, 42 feet 8½ inches; 440-yard run, 52½ seconds; broad jump, 21 feet 9½ inches; 2-mile run, 10 minutes 45½ seconds; 220-yard hurdle, 25 3-5 seconds; 220-yard dash, no time; relay race, 3 minutes 32 2-5 seconds; half-mile run, 2 minutes 4½ seconds; pole vault, 10 feet 7½ inches.

Law School Men Disqualified.

Dean Lewis, of the Law Department, sprang a surprise on Tuesday afternoon, when he announced that almost one-half of the first year class would be excluded from examinations because they had cut their limit of lectures.

Although there is no definite rule on this point, the first year men are supposed to attend at least sixty per cent of the lectures. Many of the lectures have been poorly attended, and extreme measures were to be expected. The names of those excluded will, unfortunately, not be made known until just before the final examinations. The remaining lectures of the year are being well attended in consequence of this announcement.—The Pennsylvanian.

Whipple Chosen Coach.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the University of California last Monday, James Roy Whipple was chosen coach for the coming season. "Jim" Whipple entered the University in 1896 from the Centerville High School. During his first year he played fullback on the Freshman team. Next year he played end on the Varsity, and in 1898 played tackle on the famous 22-0 team which defeated the Cardinal for the first time. He was captain of the '99 team. Lloyd A. Womble, '02, will act as assistant coach.

A. A. ATKINSON was elected track captain Monday evening. Mack is an old stand-by in track work and was the unanimous choice for this position.—The Index.

TRAIN TO MEET STANFORD.

Washington Athletes Expect to Win Meet on May 2.

The athletes of the University of Washington are training industriously for their dual field meet with Stanford University, which event will occur in Seattle on May 2. The varsity men believe that they can defeat the Southerners, and 30 men are now at work under the direction of Captain Fred Chestnut.

The Washington men are firm in the belief that they will lower Stanford's colors, and they are confident of winning from any college in the Northwest.

The second meet of the season will occur in Seattle on May 16, when the dual meet with the University of Oregon will be pulled off. Two years ago Oregon defeated the University of Washington, in Seattle, by a score of 62 to 60. Last year the annual meet was held in Eugene, the Oregon team winning by 66 1-5 to 55½. The Washington men believe that they will turn the tables this year, and say that they will score twice as many points as their opponents from Oregon.

After the meets in Seattle, the U. W. team will hold dual contests with Whitman College, Pullman Agricultural College, University of Idaho, and Spokane Athletic club.—Seattle Correspondent, Oregonian.
