DR. CONDON'S BOOK

Dr. Thomas Condon has presented to the library of the University of Oregon his recently published work on the geological formation of Oregon, entitled "The Two Islands and What Became of Them."

To the value of its text as the result of years of investigation and original thought, it adds the charm of beautiful appearance, the result of much painstaking. Prof. Condon had the happy thought of making "The Two Islands" a production of Oregon industry and was able to carry out that design almost to completeness through the supervision of its publication by his son, Mr. Herbert T. Condon, '92.

It bears the imprint of the J. K. Gill Co., Portland, Or., as publishers, and of the Irwin-Hodson Co. of the same city as printers and binders.

The animated portrait of the author, which is the appropriate frontispiece, and the satisfactory representations of fossils which illustrate the book are cylinder impressions from half-tones by Rogers and Wells, Chicago, reproduced from photographs taken at the Dorris Art Gallery of Eugene.
