On Friday evening, April 10th, the association men had the privilege of listening to an address by Professor De Cou on the subject, "Caleb, a Type of the Strenuous Life."

The account of the life of Caleb, as it is found in the 13th chapter of Numbers, furnished the basis for the address.

Caleb, because he was faithful to the trust given him by Moses when he was sent to spy out the promised land, was to receive a reward. Forty-five years after this reward had been promised the Children of Israel came into the land of Hebron. Caleb, instead of choosing as his reward the most fertile valley, rather chose a mountain which was inhabited by heathen giants. This offered a field for work which he was not loth to undertake even though he was at this time a man past eighty years of age.

A few practical lessons may be drawn from the life of Caleb. If we would receive the reward, then we must overcome many difficulties. We must grasp opportunities if we would win the things that are worth winning. We must be developed symmetrically. A sound body and a sound mind are essential but that is not enough. We must have high ideals of what manhood is and have faith in ourselves. Above all we must have faith in God. No man achieves true success without this.

After we have gained a degree of success we need not cease in our endeavors. The greatest enjoyment of life should come from making other men better. Such men as the late Mr. Corbett, President Roosevelt, Senator Hoar and William E. Gladstone are examples of men who have sought not ease but usefulness. Strive to make men better for having known you.
