Professor Charles Mills Gayley, head of the English department in the University of California, who has been given prominence recently on account of his pronounced stand against co-education, took his poetry class of 100 young women severely to task this afternoon. In arraignment of the co-eds., the angry professor said: "If God Almighty or the Angel Gabriel wrote a poem it would not interest you. You are nothing but giggling girls. Half of you ought to be made to pay tuition. The class is dismissed"

Gayley was trying to tell the women about the glories of some new poetry, but they were not interested. When Gayley delivered the admonition, he tossed his books into a hand-grip and left the classroom, leaving the girls in a state of bewilderment. There is now great indignation among the co-eds.

TRACK GOSSIP

The Oregon Agricultural College is sure of a victorious track season and is dictating the exact conditions of a meet if the State University team is to be met.

Albany College is not taking to spring athletics this year, and unless a few strong men enter college immediately the Linn county collegians will cling to last season's record. However, it is to be hoped that a team will be put on the circuit.

Hall, the crack athlete of the University of Chicago, has been suspended for cribbing in examination.

It is a significant fact that out of 42 highest scholarships at Yale, 33 fell to students who were working their way through college.

Hereafter those men who "stag it" to the Senior Prom. at the University of Nebraska will have to pay twice the usual fee.

In Germany one man in 213 goes to college; in Scotland, one in 520; in the United States, one in 2,000; in England, one in 5,000.

The Japanese students in Yale University, recently elected a committee to raise funds for Japan. The proceeds are to be devoted to the Red Cross service, the war board, and the military department. They will be sent to the Japanese consul in New York, who is commissioned to raise \$5,000,000 in the United States as soon as possible.

President Eliot, of Harvard University, in his annual report, makes the statement that the tendency toward a three-years college course is becoming stronger.

Alfred Moseley, the English manufacturer, who headed the Moseley educational commission in the United States last summer, has some interesting things to say with regard to the conditions that he found in his investigations here. He says that athletics are not practised here generally enough, and that the Americans do not enjoy the games for their physical good, but only for the test of competition involved. He thinks the English tongue is not taught carefully in America, that we have too few men teachers and too many women teachers.
