## OREGON'S WEALTH

Professor Stafford's bulletin on the  
mineral resources and industries of Ore-  
gon is now in press. This bulletin will  
strive to show where the minerals in the  
state occur, in what quantities, where it  
is possible to gain information concern-  
ing them, since many of the resources are  
not developed. The ownership of prop-  
erties, and the extent to which develop-  
ment has been carried on will also be  
set forth. Everything of economic value  
in minerals will be included in the bulle-  
tin, from asbestos to zinc.

The bulletin has been compiled through  
Professor Stafford's efforts, with the co-  
operation of people in the field who  
know the conditions. It will contain  
about 100 pages and be illustrated with  
half tone engravings and a map giving  
a graphic representation of the gold and  
silver industries of the state. The bulle-  
tin will be ready for distribution in about  
two weeks.

The gold and silver industries are  
the best developed in the state and have  
received a great amount of the attention.  
Next to these comes coal, and the stone  
and clay industries follow in order of  
importance. All the mines that have  
been developed at all are described and  
where anything significant of metal-  
lurgical practices is evident it has received  
attention. It is impossible to present an  
ideal discussion of the subject as nothing  
short of a thoroughly-equipped geological  
survey would have permitted such to  
have been presented. The bulletin, how-  
ever, contains all available information  
and will doubtless be gladly received by  
the public.
