AMENDMENTS

At the student body meeting held Friday several amendments were proposed, effecting to change the constitution and by-laws of the Associated Students. One of these is to reapportion the student body tax money in a way which will give each enterprise more nearly its correct proportion of the funds than the present distribution does. The reapportionment is recommended by the committee appointed to investigate the matter, and in their opinion, is the best readjustment that can be secured with the present amount of funds. This amendment should meet with no opposition whatever, as it has been drafted by a committee representing all of the needs and expenditures. Another amendment worthy of consideration is that to change the manner of choosing representatives for the interstate and state intercollegiate oratorical contests. The proposed amendment seeks to do away with the preliminary class contests, substituting instead a general preliminary contest; the speakers for the final local contest to be chosen from those participating in the general preliminary contest. The advantage to be gained from this change, it is claimed, will be to place the five ablest speakers in the University in the local contest, and not merely representatives from the several classes. The amendment also changes the preliminary contests to an earlier date, in order to give the final contestants more time to get ready, and in order to make the arrangement conform to the regulations of the State Intercollegiate Oratorical Association. A change was also proposed in the number of

judges for the local oratorical contest, raising the number from three to five. At the present time the speakers in the local contest speak in order of classes, freshmen first. An amendment was introduced providing that the order of speaking be determined by lot three days before the contest. This is considered by many to be a wise departure. It was proposed also to amend Article I of the constitution so as to include all students of the University in the Associated Students. The constitution as it stands at present is manifestly in error on this point of membership, when taken in its strictly literal interpretation, for it says "All students of the college of letters of the University of Oregon are members of this association." It is plain to be seen that this clause is too vague, and that it does not harmonize with the practice. Students of the College of Science and Engineering and of the School of Mines and Mining as well as students of the College of Literature, Science and The Arts, all have a part in the affairs of the Associated Students and hold office at the present time. The constitution must be amended on this point, but the amendment offered seems to be somewhat too inclusive. It would include students in the Schools of Law, Medicine and Music, none of whom are affiliated with the work of the Associated Students. An amendment, therefore, making all students in the regular collegiate departments of the University of Oregon at Eugene members of the Associated Students would be more proper.

OUR ORATORS

The University of Oregon will send two strong men to the Interstate and Intercollegiate oratorical contests. V. W. Tomlinson and J. H. Templeton, the two orators chosen, are both members of the senior class and have been prominent men in college throughout their entire courses. They have engaged in work that has well equipped them for their trials for oratorical victories. Debating, literary society work, editing college papers and corresponding for larger journals are among the activities that have occupied the attention of our two orators. Mr. Tomlinson and Mr. Templeton are mature and well-read students, and have written their orations so that they follow the lines of study pursued by each in college. The orations them-
