New Hampshire's building at the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be a reproduction of the birthplace of Daniel Webster.

At Minnesota the custom is in vogue of having the audience as well as the judges vote as to the outcome of the various debates.

Hereafter all under classmen at Annapolis using tobacco will be expelled. Only the seniors are permitted to smoke, and even then there are numerous restrictions.

The men of one of the middle west university have formed an anti-hat lifting club, and the co-eds have trumped this action by an anti-smile organization. A good scheme. Why not?
