AMENDMENTS OFFERED

The following are the amendments to Associated Students' constitution and by-laws offered at the meeting last Friday:

CONSTITUTION

ART. V.

Sec. 1. (To amend first sentence.) There shall be a committee of five competent persons to act as judges of the orations.

ART. VI.

Sec. 1. The executive committee shall choose three of the judges, and the faculty of the University shall choose the fourth and fifth.

ART. II.

Sec. 1. In the contest the order in which the contestants shall deliver their orations shall be determined by drawing lots three days before said contest.

ART. I.

Sec. 2. All students of the University of Oregon are members of this association.

ART. VII.

Sec. 1. The annual contest in oratory shall be held on the last Friday in January, to choose the representatives for the interstate and intercollegiate contests.

Sec. 2. In this contest there shall be five orators, who shall be chosen in the following manner:

Sec. 3. On the second Saturday in December of each year an oratorical contest shall be held in which any regular student of the University may participate.

A committee of five members of the faculty, appointed by the President of the University, shall act as judges and shall decide upon the persons best qualified to enter the January contest.

BY LAWS

Sec. 3. The dues of five dollars (\$5.00) per capita shall be divided in the following proportion among the several student enterprises: Football, twenty-eight (28) per cent. Track team, twenty-two (22) per cent. Treasurer Associated Students, three (3) per cent. Publications, fifteen (15) per cent. Miscellaneous, to be expended by executive committee, including fees to debating and oratorical association, fifteen (15) per cent. Glee Club seventeen (17) per cent.

TRACK WORK
