The Varsity Circus as planned promises to be the big event of the year. Prof. Daggy and Dr. Roller have the work well in hand and the various committees bring in favorable reports. It is the plan to have a complete show, the large gym floor being used for the main attraction. The girl's gym will furnish the menagerie space, while the handball room will be turned into side show tents. The show will be complete in every detail from the peanuts and monkey to the ever ready clown. Varsity material will be used for a greater part of the work, although many features will be added by outside talent. The Jipsu exhibition in wrestling and boxing by native Japanese troupe will be an interesting feature. This much talked about system will be carried out as only the Japanese can do it. The congress of clowns will include Japanese and Russian court jesters, rustic, German broad face, Humpy Dumpty, French Comique, Carrie Nation and the Yellow Kid, in fact the clowns will furnish an endless chain of amusement for the big crowd. The tumbling, bar work, etc., is being cared for by Dr. Roller and Tom McDonald. Several of the local Y. M. C. A. men will assist. Another feature will be the congress of aborigines—ten native Indians in native costume. They will give the war dance and do a few other original stunts. Everything possible is being done to make the show a success; professional jugglers, rope walkers, etc will be employed.

The challenge for a series of baseball games with Waseda University of Japan, received last semester by Manager Barret, has been accepted, and the varsity will play two games with the Japanese. The Japanese team won the championship of Japan last year and this year has a very strong nine, which will come to America to play what will probably be the first international game of its kind ever played. The visitors will leave Japan during the last part of March and come directly to Stanford, where they will be entertained by the Japanese Club. While on the campus the nine will practice on the varsity diamond every morning. The Japanese will play two games with Stanford, one before and one after the last game of the intercollegiate series. At present it is not known whether both of the games will be played

on the campus, as Manager Barret may try to have one of the games played in San Francisco. According to the arrangements made with Iso Abe, superintendent of the athletic department of Waseda University, the Japanese will pay all their expenses and receive two-thirds of the gate receipts of the games. It is probable that after arriving in this country the Waseda nine will arrange a series of games with other teams on the Coast.—Daily Palo Alto.

A bill recently passed by the Pennsylvania legislature makes hazing a crime. It declares that if any person or persons shall maliciously inflict on any person any grievous bodily harm by what is commonly known as hazing, either with or without any weapon or instrument, while attending or going to or coming from any of the common schools, colleges, universities or any other institution of learning within this commonwealth, he, she or they shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. "Being convicted, he, she or they shall be sentenced to a fine not exceeding \$500, or undergo an imprisonment of not more than six months, or both."—Athenaeum.

President Eliot, of Harvard University has been giving vigorous expression to his opinion of athletics. In his annual report, he is unsparing in denunciation of the spirit and temper which characterize college sports, and condemns, in no measured terms, the brutality and the gambling tendency which seem to be necessary accompaniments of football. That there are abuses of collegiate sports which demand correction, no one will question, but that such a sweeping indictment of athletics in general can be made to hold, few will agree.
