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WINSLOW GETS MEDAL

Alumni Medal for Best Individual Debater
Awarded Friday

The second annual Alumni debate was held in Villard Hall last Friday night, and the medal was awarded to Mr. Walter C. Winslow, '06, who showed the best qualifications as a debater. The teams representing the Laurean and Philologian literary societies argued the question "Resolved, That it should be the policy of the United States not to hold territory unless with the purpose that it shall ultimately enjoy statehood." The sides and places were both determined by lot one hour before the debate came off, thus giving each man exactly the same chance to show his preparation. Mr. Rafferty, while not contesting for the medal, made the opening speech by agreement, and followed by Steiwer and Stockwell on the affirmative side of the question. Mr. Galloway spoke first for the negative side and was followed by Veatch and Winslow. Mr. Winslow had the last place in order, and to him was the good fortune to win the decision of the judges. It may be said that while Mr. Winslow's work was excellent, a fine showing was made by each debater and the decision was by all means a close one.

The judges of the debate were Judge Potter, '87; Justice C. A. Wintermeier, '96, and Professor L. C. Carson. Professor I. M. Glen acted as chairman of the evening. The debate aroused no little interest among the society men and promises to become a regular event of importance in the University. The medal is a handsome gold one with the state seal prominent in the design.

FRESHMAN DEBATE

Under the agreement adopted last year by the Laurean and Philologian societies, the debate between the freshmen members of the two societies will be held in Villard Hall on the evening of March 24. There was considerable interest taken in the tryouts of the societies and the debate promises to be full of freshman life and vigor.

The question debated will be on the adoption of the ship subsidy by the United States. This matter has been pending in congress for some time, and the truth or falsehood in Mark Hanna's pet scheme will be brought out in the coming debate.

The Laureans will be represented by Watson, Young and Frank Mount, who will support the affirmative, while Shirk, McCarty and Mitchell will uphold the negative for the Philologians.
