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A GREAT RALLY

The football rally held on Kincaid Field Friday evening marked an epoch in the history of the University of Oregon. This was the first time a rally was ever systematically arranged and followed a definite program. It was characterized by all the features which make the rallies in the great universities interesting and spectacular.

At seven-thirty every male student in the University met on Kincaid Field, and with lighted torches and lock-step marched around the goal-posts, then with a yell they closed in and threw their torches on a huge pile of wood saturated with oil. In a few seconds the whole pile was in flames and the performance began.

Regent Friendly addressed the crowd, in a brief, enthusiastic speech, encouraged the team, and urged the rooters to back them up. He was followed by Coach Bruce Shorts who expressed his appreciation of the way in which the college had supported the team. C. N. McArthur, the ever-present alumnus, spoke briefly and to the point on the duties of both team and rooters in the coming game. Captain Latourette gave a brief address, then the rooters, led by the band, began to make "Big Medicine." Back and forth across the field they marched, singing their war songs. The grandstand was filled with applauding spectators and the great bonfire lighted the scene. Several times they circled around the field, ending by forming the two giant letters "U" and "O." Then three abreast they danced the famous "serpentine." When this spectacular dance was concluded they formed in line and with back step marched past the grandstand, circled the goal-posts several times and closed in around the speakers platform where they were addressed by Mayor Wilkins.

This ended the greatest and most successful rally ever held in Eugene. The night was ideal and one watching the rooters as they danced and sang on the sawdust field could not help being moved by the enthusiasm which every student in the University displayed.

Next week the regular track squad will be organized and winter work will commence. Work will be carried on outdoors when the weather permits. It will be very beneficial to any man who intends to try for the track team next spring to get busy at once and also to stay busy all winter. The work will be general building up work with especial attention given to the different proclivities of the candidates.—Wave.

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
