MAY STUDENTS VOTE?

It is reported that the municipal league of Eugene intends to seek indictments against students of the University who voted in the recent city election without being entitled to residence in Eugene. There has always been more or less friction about the student vote, and the movement against college votes has threatened to become serious several times in the history of the University. The present opposition argues that certain students voted in the municipal election who had homes elsewhere, and clearly violated the law, since "a student neither gains nor loses a residence by attending an institution of learning."

In regard to the matter the Eugene Register has the following to say:

"The student should not lose any sleep over being prosecuted for illegal voting if he has resided in Lane county ninety days, in the precinct where he voted thirty days, and in the state the required six months. The matter of a single man's franchise has been thrashed over time and again in all sections of this country and no law has yet been ample in provisions to deprive him of a vote, and none have been framed with that purpose in view. Where a single man claims his residence, there it is, provided he has been there long enough to gain a residence. If he does not vote there, he may vote where he had prior residence, even if he must return from the other side of the globe. No court has ever assisted in disfranchising a single man's vote, and the law is liberal on this point, and it should be. If a student votes without having gained the right, that is another matter, and he is amenable. But in case he is fully equipped to exercise his right to vote, nobody may with propriety question his voting. This is a free country, and voting is about the greatest proof of this."

"OTHELLO" AT ASSEMBLY

The assembly hour last week was occupied by Professor Glen who finished his lectures on Othello. The week before he admirably interpreted the play as written by Shakespeare, reading a large portion of it, and comparing it with similar parts in the opera. Last Wednesday he discussed the opera, illustrating his lecture with several of the more important songs. The first was one that was sung by Iago when he tells Othello of Cassio's possession of the handkerchief. Verdi catches the spirit of the situation and portrays Iago's villainy with a vividness scarcely reached by the drama. In the play we have to interpret from the lines themselves, while in the opera every emotion is intensified by the spirit of the music. Prof. Glen's beautiful voice brought out wonderfully the dramatic power and strength of the composer's ideas. The love song and "Ave Maria" of Desdemona are full of pathos and simplicity, and here again the singer's ability to catch the spirit of the opera was displayed.

Prof. Glen had able assistance in Miss Whiteside at the piano. Her accompaniments are always intelligent and sympathetic.

The largest commission handed out to a Yale man recently is the job which has been offered to Yu Chaun Chang, 1903, by the Emperor of China. He has invited Chang to look up the legal system of Germany and to make an official report of it to the Imperial Government. Chang has just accepted the invitation and has gone to Berlin to begin his task. His report will be made to the Imperial Chinese Commission which is now touring this country. Chang was given the degree of doctor of common law from Yale Law School three years ago, graduating with high honors.—Pioneer.
