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OREGON'S GLORIOUS VICTORY

Kelly Breaks Coast Records in Broad Jump and 100-yard Dash—McKinney puts Shot 45 feet

Before one of the largest crowds ever assembled on Kincaid Field to witness a track meet, the University of Oregon athletes defeated those of Oregon Agricultural College by the decisive score of 76 to 46. Dan Kelly was the star of the day. He broke the coast record in the broad jump, making 24 feet 2 1/4 inches, the best jump made in years. He ran the 100-yard dash in the remarkable time of 9 4-5 seconds. He won the 220-yard dash and also tied for first place in the high jump. The Northwest shot put record held by Tom McDonald, of Washington, was broken by Henry McKinney, who put the shot 45 feet 2 1/2 inches. Gordon Moores equaled the Northwest record in the high hurdles by running them in 16 seconds. George Hug broke his own state record in the hammer and discus throws. Friessel won the low hurdles and broad jumped 22 feet 9 1/2 inches. Kuykendall was a close second to Moores in the high hurdles. In fact, everybody did fine work. The time in the distance runs was slow, owing to the wet condition of the track.

One great feature of the day was the music by the band. The band was composed of University players and directed by Frank Carruth. Carruth deserves great credit in getting up this band, for it inspired the boys to do better. The crowd was also of good size and enthusiasm was not lacking when one of the men did great work.

The first event of the day was the 100-yard dash. In this event Smithson, of O. A. C., was regarded as a winner, but Kelly ran it in the remarkable time of 9 4-5 seconds. He took the lead at the start and gradually gained until at the end of the race he had his opponent defeated by five yards. Smithson was second, with Moores close on his heels for third place.

The next event was the half-mile run, and O. A. C. secured all three places. Greenhaw first, Devolt second, and Goodrich third. Bob Overteuffer took the lead

on the first lap, but was beaten in on the sprint at the last of the race.

The shot-put was won by McKinney by making a distance of 45 feet 2 1/2 inches and breaking the Northwest record and almost equalling the Coast record. Hug secured second place with a put of 40 feet 8 1/2 inches, and Finn of O. A. C. third at 37 feet 3 inches, defeating Arnspiger of Oregon by half an inch.

Kelly won the 220-yard dash from Smithson easily, and Beach of O. A. C. secured third place. Time of race 22 4-5 seconds.

The 440 run was won by Greenhaw. Beach was second and Veatch third. Prideaux took the lead at the first, but was unable to hold his speed at the last. Time of race 54 2-5.

Friessel won the 220-yard hurdles, with Moores second. Smithson secured third. Time 27 seconds.

Hug won the discus at 113 feet 2 inches. McKinney got second at 109 feet 6 inches. McKinney was looked upon to win this event, as he had been hurling the discus over 120 feet in practice. He was out of form Saturday. Dunlap took third with a throw of 105 feet 9 inches. Hug broke the University record in this event.

The mile run was won by Devolt, who was hard pressed by Lowell and Mitchell of Oregon, who secured second and third respectively.

In the high jump Kelly, Kuykendall and Moores had to go only 5 feet 2 inches to secure all three places. They did not jump it off.

The hammer throw was won by Hug, making 132 feet 7 inches. Second place was won by Dunlap of O. A. C. at 126 feet, and third by Hall at 123 feet. McKinney and Moullen had been throwing it over 125 feet, but the former could not stay in the ring. Hug broke his own state record by 4 feet in this throw.

Kelly made his wonderful broad jump of 24 feet 2 1/2 inches. He jumped over 23 feet several times. The time Kelly made his famous jump Hayward placed an envelope at 24 feet, and Kelly leaped over it to the surprise of all. This is the best jump made for years, and it may be said that only three men have ever gone over 24 feet in the running broad jump. Friessel took second with a jump of 22

feet 9 1/2 inches, which, if it had not been for Kelly's jump, would be a record itself. Swann took third.

The pole vault was won by Moullen at 10 feet 10 inches. Swann was second at 10 feet 6 inches, and Burns third at 10 feet 4 inches.

The high hurdles were won by Moores. Kuykendall was a close second and Friessel third. Moores tied the Northwest record, but it was not allowed, as too many hurdles were knocked down. The time was 16 flat.

The mile relay was won by O. A. C. in the time of 3 minutes 38 seconds. Schrouder, Beach, Devolt and Greenhaw ran for O. A. C., while Prideaux, Overteuffer, Friessel and Veatch ran for Oregon.
