The annual student-body election of officers took place at Villard Hall Wednesday. For three years he has held the position of center on the football team, and has always been an important man on the track team, of which he has been captain for the last two years. At present he is an associate editor of the Oregon Weekly, and a most valuable member of the staff.

Ray Fountain, '07, was elected vice president. He is intensely interested in student enterprises, and is yeller of the rooters' club.
