PRESIDENTS HOLD CONFERENCE

Association Football Discussed—Other Sports Taken Up

Presidents Campbell and McClain of the Universities of Oregon and Idaho, and Professor Bishop of the University of Washington, held a conference on sports during the recent triangular track meet at Seattle. The discussion brought out was merely preliminary and no definite action in regard to athletics in the Northwest was taken. It is the intention, since the movement has been started, to hold a similar meet some time next year at which a representative of every college and university in the Northwest will be asked to be present. Some concerted action will then be taken upon football.

The general sentiment at Seattle was that no definite action should be taken until the new rules had had a trial. The question of association football was freely discussed. The game is now played by a number of colleges and is becoming a popular intercollegiate sport in some of the largest universities in the East. It is very probable that it will be adopted in the Northwest as a side issue. It will not, in any event, take the place of regulation football. Should it be adopted, many men now unable to play on account of their light weight, would be given a chance to show their agility. It argued that more men are able to play association football than are able to indulge in the strenuous game as it is now played by our Western colleges. Thus a much larger squad of men could gain benefit from the game.

The question of freshmen in athletics was also discussed. It has been the rule in a number of colleges to exclude freshmen from athletics, but it seems that present conditions in the Northwest did not warrant any such action being taken. The plan is to keep out "ringers." President Campbell says: "I think the plan to exclude freshmen from athletics in the Northwest is unnecessary at the present time. Under present conditions the quality of intercollegiate athletics is very pure and with proper care they should remain in this condition."

BASEBALL GAME SATURDAY

The Portland team is very fast and includes in its line-up Kenneth Fenton and Stott, third baseman and catcher respectively of the Stanford University team, and Trowbridge, formerly shortstop and captain of the Stanford nine. The game Saturday will be called at 3:30 in order that the business men of the city will have a chance to attend. Admission 25 cents; grandstand 10 cents.

MOORES ELECTED TRACK CAPTAIN.

Gordon C. Moores was on Monday elected by his team mates to captain next year's track team. Moores has been a valuable man on the track for three years and deserves the honor that has fallen upon him. His election meets with the hearty approval of the students. His special work on the track is the dashes and the hurdles, although he is a high and a broad jumper of no mean ability. He holds the Northwest record in the 220-yard hurdles, his time being 25 2-5 seconds. He runs the high hurdles in 16 seconds. At the Columbia meet in May he ran the 50-yard in 5 2-5 seconds, which is equal to the world's record for indoor contests. Gordon Moores is a popular member of the junior class and the Kappa Sigma fraternity.
