

Mr. Frazer pianist and Miss McAlister, accompanist, and Mr. Belcher of Portland all added to their laurels by the artistic rendering of their parts of the program. Professor Glen also gave fresh proof of his superb musical taste in the manner in which he directed the orchestra, not only at the Monday night concert, but whenever they made their appearance.

The closing number of the concert program, being a mighty climax in and of itself, was the climax, as well, of the evening's music, and was so splendidly produced that the entire audience went wild over it. It is the writer's observation that the sextet from Donizetti's "Lucia" can scarcely be well sung, without placing those singing under immediate obligations of repeating it. This was the case Monday night. The sextet was sung by Messrs. Glen, Belcher, Abbett and Frazer and Misses Stinson and Yoran, accompanied by the entire orchestra. Many hearers pronounced the concert the finest thing of its kind ever given in Eugene. It was a great feather in the cap of the Music School faculty.

Tuesday.

The chief business during the day on Tuesday was the annual business meeting of the Alumni Association, held in McClure Hall.

The Failing and Beekman oration contest occupied the evening of Tuesday. There was a large crowd present to hear the orations—and the music by the orchestra. The senior class sat on the rostrum immediately behind the six orators, all dressed in senior's garb. The contest itself was a very evenly matched one, and made considerable deliberation on the part of the judges necessary before a decision could be reached. The six orators were Miss Nellie Foshay, M. F. McClain, Miss Norma Hendricks, Miss Victoria Mitchell, Loris Johnson and W. C. Winslow; the winners were Miss Hendricks first place, Mr. Johnson second place. The orations of the winners appear elsewhere in this paper. While the judges were trying to reach a decision the audience kept the orchestra busy playing encores, and enjoyed the suspense as well as they might.

The president's reception in the afternoon was a very delightful occasion, and was largely attended by the alumni, seniors and friends both from within and without Eugene. President Campbell and Mrs. Zieber received the guests in the left parlor of the president's house, and cooling refreshments were dispensed in the dining room by young ladies from the undergraduate classes.

MULTNOMAH'S OR OREGON'S.

There is a movement on foot to send Dan Kelly, Oregon's champion sprinter, to the September meet of the Amateur Athletic Union as a representative of the Multnomah Club. The meet will be held in Chicago, and any honors that the Oregon lad might win would go to the credit of Multnomah. Kelly is a student in the University of Oregon, and if he goes to Chicago should go as a representative of the University, and not the Multnomah Club. Kelly was developed by an Oregon trainer, and all of his associations are with the University, rather than the Club. It is evident that Multnomah is trying to rob Oregon of a distinction that belongs altogether to the 'Varsity, and with her customary hoggishness wants to send Kelly to Chicago as a product of the Multnomah Club. It is up to Oregon students and alumni to see to it that Kelly goes to Chicago wearing the colors of the University of Oregon. Funds can be raised to meet the expenses of sending the fleet-footed lad to the Windy City, and arrangements should be made to send Trainer Bill Hayward with him.

There is no doubt about the Baker City lad's ability to make good in the Chicago meet. During the past year Kelly ran the 100 yd. dash in 9 3-5 equaling the world's record and breaking the world's amateur record. He ran the 220 yd. dash in 21 1-5 equaling the amateur record, and he also established a new coast record of 24 feet 2 1-2 inches for the broad jump.

It is the opinion of Trainer Hayward that Kelly is the greatest athlete on earth and the opinion is not far from correct. In the recent P. N. A. meet at Spokane, Kelly did phenomena! work in the sprints, wearing the colors of the Multnomah Club. Out of a total of 69 points won by Multnomah in the Spokane meet, the four Oregon men—Kelly, Moores, Hug, and McKinney—won 54.

Multnomah would have certainly been in a bad way had not Oregon come to the rescue.
