Above is the result of the trip made through Washington and Idaho during the vacation period. While the number of games won does not compare very favorably with the number of games lost, still the men on the team are in a measure satisfied with the trip.

The Multnomah game in Portland resulted in a decided victory for Oregon by a score of 12 to 6. On Monday at The Dalles "Terry" Beck pitched against the men of his home town and won from them by the score of 3 to 1. On Tuesday at Colfax the Trolley League team of the Inland Empire was met. Up to the eighth inning Pitcher Clifford had the leaguers guessing and the score stood 3 to 1 in favor of Oregon. A windstorm in this inning blew dust in Catcher Johnson's eyes and so confused the fielders that they were unable to judge high flies with any degree of accuracy and the result was that the Colfax nine crossed the home plate seven times. In the ninth inning Oregon was unable to score and the final result showed Colfax the winner by the decisive score of 8 to 3.

Wednesday's and Thursday's games were played at Pullman with the Washington State College nine. On Wednesday the Oregon squad was literally "beaten to a custard". Pullman's representatives trotted across the home plate a total of fourteen times while

Oregon could only send across three men. On Thursday Harold Clifford was in the box for Oregon and held the Pullmanites down to three runs until the ninth inning, when a group of errors on the part of the Beaver team allowed an Evergreen man to cross the plate. The close score of this game, 4 to 3, made it one of the most interesting of the trip.

On Friday afternoon at Moscow, Oregon met Idaho for the first time in baseball. This game was very exciting, and many of the U. of O. players say Oregon should have won it; but the score at the close, 3 to 1 in favor of Idaho, proves that they did not.

At Walla Walla on Saturday the final game of the series was played with Whitman College. While the Congregational nine only got three hits off Clifford, who was in the box for Oregon, they chalked up a total of six runs. Pitcher Marquis, of Whitman, was very effective in the box and completely shut out Oregon. Marquis was the best slabster met on the trip.
