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OREGON TO MEET PULLMAN

At Eugene on Friday, May 17—Contest Will Figure Strongly in Deciding Northwest Championship

Oregon will meet Pullman Friday afternoon. This will be the most important dual meet this year, as Pullman is easily stronger than O. A. C. or Whitman. In the triangular meet held last Saturday at Pullman between Washington State College, Whitman College, and the University of Idaho, Pullman came off victorious with a total of 51 points, to 36 for Whitman, and 35 for Idaho. Many good records were made and on the other hand some of the records were seemingly poor, considering the number of athletes entered in the various events.

By all the dope that can be figured on the Oregon - Pullman meet, Oregon stands to win with a good margin, providing a majority of her stars are in good shape.

In the sprints Pullman is said to have a "speeder" in Meyer, but if he finishes ahead of Kelly, Moores, and Huston in the 100 and 220, he will at least know he has been

in a race. He was beaten by Cox of Whitman in both of these events, but that does not signify much for Cox is recognized as a fast man.

Oregon ought to carry off the jumps wholesale, judging from Pullman's not getting a place in the broad-jump at 20 feet, 8 inches, nor in the high-jump at 5 feet, 7 inches. The varsity has at least three men in the broad jump who can do over 20 feet, 6 inches, not counting Dan Kelly who holds

the Coast Record at 24 feet, 2½ inches, and in the high-jump we have three men able to clear better than 5 feet, 6 inches. In the pole-vault Moullen for Oregon ought to take first, and Freshman Robinson will give Pullman a rub for second or third, as their best man did only 10 feet, 3 inches.

Pullman ought to make her best showing in the distances as her records appear to indicate. In the 440 yard dash Thomle is their best point winner, and as he is good for 51 3-5 sec. it looks as if there would be some fast travelling when he and Reed, of the 'Varsity hook up. This is Reed's first year in representing the 'Varsity

FIFTEEN YEARS AT OREGON

Y. M. C. A. Founded at the University of Oregon by John Mott in February, 1892.

"The object of the Young Men's Christian Association is to encourage and promote Christian work, Christian living and Christian ideals in student life." These words from one of the early handbooks issued by the Association, set forth the purposes of the Young Men's Christian Association which was organized in the University of Oregon by John R. Mott in February, 1892. The Association was one of the ten organized in the ten days preceding the first Northwest convention which was held at Salem, and which was the largest Christian student conference that had been held in America up to that time. The first president of the Association was F. S. Dunn, now a professor in the University.

Meetings for the first few months were held in Mount's hall in town but at the opening of the following University year a room was secured on the campus. At first the weekly devotion meetings were held on Wednesday,

but were later changed to Friday.

Classes in Bible study were early organized in the Association there being 10 enrolled in the first year out of a membership of 19.

Devotional meetings to the number of 30 or more were held each year, besides the joint meetings with the Y. W. C. A. The receptions to new students were a feature of the Association's activity from an early date. In
