His High School Team at Seattle Won the Championship of America

On Monday evening the Athletic Council met to elect a coach for the season of 1907. Hugo Bezdek, who coached last year, proposed a salary which was beyond the purse of the student-body and the names of Hoagland and Jennings, of Princeton, Gurtis, of Michigan, Reynolds, of Pennsylvania, and Frost, of Dartmouth, were considered and the choice of the Council was unanimous for Frost. Coach Frost was highly recommended by Bruce Shorts and his abilities are

shown in the following article from the Seattle Times:

"Gordon B. Frost, instructor in mathematics in the Seattle High School, and coach for the past two years of the football team—national scholastic champions of 1906—has been engaged by the athletic council of the University of Oregon at Eugene next season. Announcement of this selection was formally made by the council last evening, although it was known last Saturday that the position had been tendered him and had been accepted.

The loss to the Seattle High School football team in the impending departure of Coach Frost will be keenly felt here and the Oregon University is to be congratulated on getting the

services of one who has gained through the work of the local school boys, an eminent position in football training on the Pacific Coast.

Frost is a graduate of Dartmouth, where he played at end and also behind the line on the 'varsity team of which Coach Place of the University of Washington was captain. Upon graduation, he coached a year at Dartmouth and then came to the Coast, entering on the duties of instructor in mathematics in the Seattle High School two years ago.

After defeating team after team, representing the various schools of this state, the Lick school of California and the school team of Butte, Frost's boys won the championship of the schools of the United States by defeating the North Division school of Chicago, champions of the Middle West and the conquerors of the Brooklyn High School, the representative school team of the Atlantic Coast.

It was in the recognition of his ability that the University of Oregon council took up Frost and made him head coach there next fall. It is to be regretted that his services could not have been retained here but the work he will do in the South will be followed with greatest interest by his many friends and admirers.
