OREGON WINS FIRST GAME

Gritty Eleven From Pacific University Play Hard But is Completely Outclassed.

The first game on the University of Oregon's schedule was clipped from the list Saturday when the 'Varsity men defeated Pacific University, by a score of 52 to 0. The Forest Grove team fought stubbornly throughout, but their light weight and inexperience made any progress against the Oregon team impossible. Although the game Saturday was too one-sided to be interesting and to even test the strength of the Oregon team, there were several important things brought out which Coach Frost will not be long in remedying.

In the first place it can be said that Gordon B. Frost has instilled into his men a fighting spirit, a "pull-together-and-every-body-in-the-game" system, and a practical knowledge of the game, that will stand the team in good stead throughout the season. The game on Saturday proved this if nothing else., that the same quality of Oregon fighting spirit and football enthusiasm is being imbibed out on Kincaid Feld this year as ever. However, there was "raggedness" in both the offensive and defensive work of the 'Varsity men at times, and we must wait until after the Idaho game next Saturday to pass judgment upon our heroes.

Throughout the game Saturday the best of feeling prevailed and the Oregon rooters unselfishly shared their enthusiasm with the losing team. Oregon's first team played throughout the first half, with the exception of Captain Moores who was replaced by Oberteuffer at the end of ten minutes' play an account of an injury to his back. At the beginning of the second half three men were replaced and after seven minutes of play none of the first team were on the field.

First Half.

Clarke kicked off for Oregon and booted the ball over Pacific's goal line. Capt. Moores sprinted over the line and recovered the ball while P. U.'s men apparently looked on. This was

the first instance known here of a touchdown being made on the kickoff, in the Northwest. Clarke missed the goal. Score, Oregon 5; Pacific, 0.

Clarke kicked off to Humphreys, who ran in 10 yards. A half back buck was blocked and on the next play Clarke of Oregon put Aller back for a loss. Ferrin then punted to Clarke who ran in ten yards. Zacharias cut the end for 14 yards. Taylor and Zacharias carried the ball 10 yards more, when Clarke was sent through the line for a touchdown. Clarke missed an easy goal. Score Oregon, 10; Pacific, 0.

Ferrin of P. U. kicked off to Clarke who ran in 20 yards.. On the next play Zacharias, with a splendid interference, circled P. U.'s left end 85 yards for a touchdown. Clarke kicked the goal. Score, Oregon, 16; Pacific, 0.

Ferrin kicked off to Arnspiger who ran in 8 yards. A forward pass was missed and the Oregon team penalized 15 yards. At this stage of the game P. U. secured the ball on a fumble. Pacific's line buck was blocked and the next play their forward pass was caught by Capt. Moores on the Oregon 35 yard line, who carried the ball 75 yards for the fourth touchdown in 12 minutes of play. Clarke kicked the goal. Score, Oregon, 22; Pacific, 0.

Ferrin kicked to Taylor of Oregon, who advanced the ball 25 yards. Taylor, Zacharias, and Arnspiger made good gains. Moores was hurt at this stage and replaced by Oberteuffer. Another forward pass gave P. U. the ball again. P. U. punted. Zacharias, Kuykendall and Clarke soon covered the remaining distance for the fifth touchdown. Clarke kicked the goal. Score, Oregon, 28; Pacific, 0.

Ferrin kicked again to Taylor who ran in 20 yards. The same story was repeated within three minutes and the sixth goal was kicked. Score, Oregon, 34; Pacific, 0.

The first half ended before scrimmage was again started.

Second Half.

At the beginning of the second half Oberteuffer went to left half, Dodson

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CLUBS ENDORSE UNIVERSITY

Resolutions Are Passed by Portland Commercial Club Favoring University Appropriation.

With a very few exceptions, every newspaper in the state of Oregon is friendly to the University and will work for the passage of the University appropriation bill at the election next June.

This fact alone should please all those interested in the affairs of our college; but all should be still more pleased to know that the Portland Commercial Club, the leading organization of its kind in the state, had also endorsed the University appropriation bill and would work for the building of a greater University for the state of Oregon.

The University appropriation bill was the general topic for discussion at the monthly dinner of the Commercial club on last Tuesday evening, and many able speakers were heard on the subject. Among those who addressed the club were, Pres. P. L. Campbell of the University; Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Oregonian; Clifton N. McArthur, a prominent Portland attorney; W. D. Fenton, attorney for the Southern Pacific R. R. Co.; Jerry Bronough, one of Portland's leading legal lights; Frederick V. Holman and Col. R. A. Miller.

President Campbell closed the meeting with a short talk on the University and why the appropriation should be made.

At the conclusion of the speeches, William Reidt moved that it be the sense of the meeting that the Club favor the passage of the University appropriation bill. The motion carried unanimously.

In his address to the club, President Campbell laid great stress upon the fact that the majority of the students at the University are the sons of parents of only fair financial standing and that over seventy per cent of the boys in the institution are working their way through college either wholly or in part.

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
