NEW RULES VERY STRINGENT

Faculty Adopts Plan Which Will
Make Graduation Hard for the
Occasional Flunker.

New rules recently adopted by the faculty of the University will make it hard for students who have flunked occasionally, to graduate with their class. Students hereafter must obtain a passing grade in practically all of their subjects or be forced to spend extra time at the University before receiving their degrees. Below are the new regulations:

First: Students admitted as Freshmen, but having entrance conditions, may be allowed to make up during the first two years of their course, either in the University or elsewhere, a total equivalent of one preparatory unit; but the total number of hours for any one semester shall not exceed eighteen.

Second: Students admitted to classes above the Freshman, but having deficiencies, may be allowed to carry an average of thirty-four semester hours per year, including work in the Summer School (if any), but not more than eighteen hours may be carried during any one semester. In case this provision will not admit a graduation within the time proposed, no extra work shall be allowed. Permission to carry extra hours shall not be granted under this provision to students whose deficiencies result from failure.

Third: Students without deficiencies, whose record for the preceding semester shows a grade of at least "B" in two thirds of their work, and no grade below "C" may be permitted to carry a maximum of eighteen hours; but the extra course or courses shall not count for graduation. Students carrying extra work under this provision shall be required to drop it in case their standing in any subject is reported below "C."
