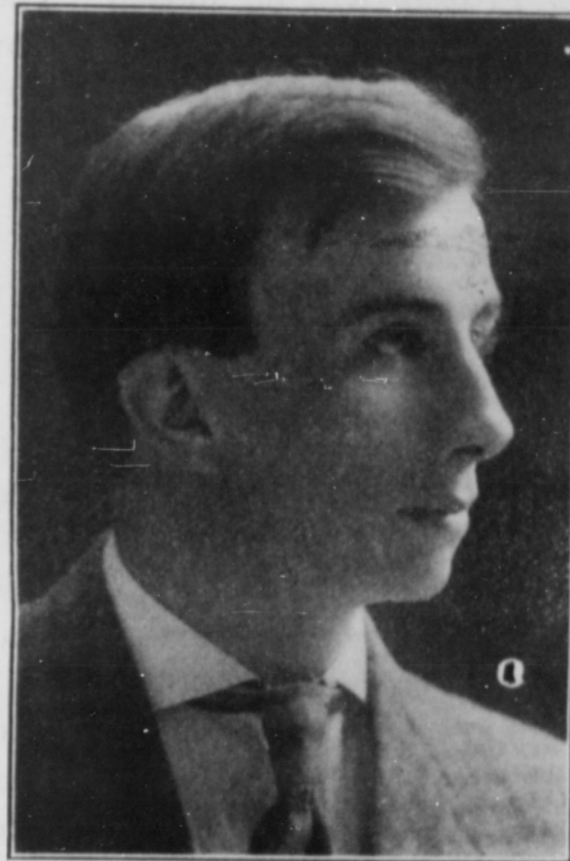
## NEWSPAPERS ARE FRIENDLY

"If the people of Oregon really knew what the State University is doing for the education of the youth of the state, there would be but few votes against the University appropriation next June.
