Oregon Agricultural College Five Defeats University of Oregon Basketball Team

The fast team of Oregon Agricultural College defeated the University team at basketball last Saturday night at the armory. The first half ended in Oregon's favor, but in the second half the college men gained the lead and kept it throughout. From the standpoint of the spectator, the game was the best of the season. After some minutes of hard playing, Van Scoy threw the first basket. The next score was made by Moore, of the visiting team, who threw a basket from the foul line. Moore, who was easily the star for O. A. C., threw two baskets more in rapid succession. Then Oregon rallied. Loosley scored on a long toss, and Hathaway followed with two baskets in less than a minute. The next three baskets were thrown by O. A. C., two of them by the big center, Foster, who played a splendid game. Hathaway threw the last goal of the first half. The score—O. A. C. 11; Oregon, 12.

Second Half.

Ramp replaced Van Scoy at forward. The teams seemed of equal strength, but the deadly accuracy of Moore, O. A. C.'s freshman forward, proved Oregon's undoing. Two fouls thrown by him, and four goals, three of which he made, brought the score to 22 for O. A. C. Hathaway, playing desperately, brought Oregon's score to 14 by a difficult goal. Farrington aided by the splendid work of Ramp, gave Oregon two points more. In the remaining few minutes of play the college men ran up the score to 29 while Hathaway, Loosley and Ramp threw a basket each which gave Oregon 21 points. Loosley, Hathaway and Farrington were stars for Oregon. Ramp's defensive work in the second half was excellent; Van Scoy, in the first half, played a hard and brilliant game. Foster, Rooper and Moore did the best work for O. A. C. There was considerable fouling, but the game was played in the best of spirit. The lineup:

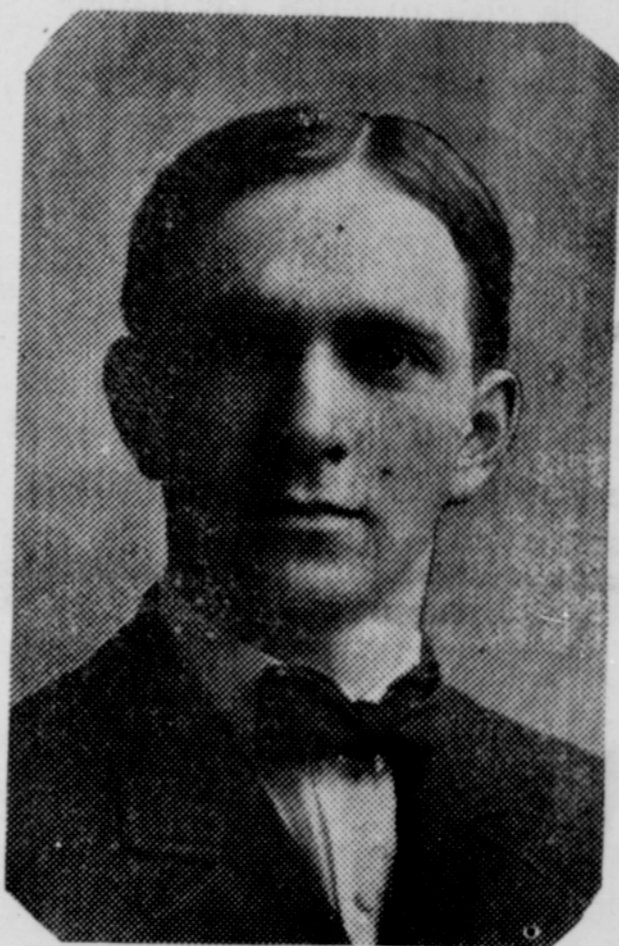
O. A. C.: Moore and Horton, forwards; Foster, center; Rooper and Speirs, guards.

Hamble made the most spectacular throw of the evening, from the center of the field, but the score was not counted as the whistle had been blown. At forward in the second half, Strong threw five baskets. Charman at guard played an aggressive game. Dean, Moore and Ramp were point winners. Swift and Starbuck did well in the second half. TRACK SCHEDULE APPROVED

Oregon Track Squad Will Make Trip in May to Meet Eastern Washington Colleges

The track team schedule as arranged by Manager Bean was confirmed by the faculty last week at a meeting of that body. This insures the trip into the Inland Empire to meet Whitman and Washington State Colleges. The trip will require four and one half college days which is contrary to the three day ruling of the faculty, hence a special dispensation was necessary. The Athletic Council sanctioned the schedule at the December meeting and there is now no doubt concerning any of the meets as all contracts have been forwarded for signatures. This means five big intercollegiate contests; the Columbia Indoor meet in April, the Whitman meet on May 14, the W. S. C. meet on May 16, the O. A. C. contest on May 22, and the Triangular meet at Seattle on May 30. This is an excellent schedule, and will decide the Northwest championship beyond a doubt.

Besides these events there are yet three inter-class meets arranged, the largest of which will be the indoor tournament at the Armory on Mar. 6. The latter will be something new in University athletics and Manager Bean of the track team who is directing the proceedings promises to give the public something worth going to see.
