The departure of Ray Kerr, '10, for Annapolis to enter the U. S. Naval academy will recall to the minds of many that this is the second U. O. student to receive such an appointment, Roy H. Davis, ex '08, being the first. Since entering Davis has won many honors which reflect great credit upon the state and the University. As a first year man he won distinction on the track by capturing first places in the half mile and the mile runs. In the spring of the same year he tried out for the rowing crews, rising from the fourth crew to the first before the end of the season. In every race in which he participated, his crew was victorious, the last race being with Yale from which he derived considerable press notice. In the fall of his second year he was chosen by his three hundred fellow classmen as their president which is the greatest honor a class can bestow upon a member, as it is the only election of the four years. Last spring he was successful in making his place on the final crew again, and was the lighter in weight by 20 pounds than any other member.

Davis has two more years yet and his many friends hope that he will continue in his good fortune.
