### REV. ORA C. WRIGHT SPEAKS

To Friday Evening's Meeting of the  
Young Men's Christian Association.

Rev. O. C. Wright, of the Baptist church, talked at Y. M. C. A. on the subject: "The World's Greatest Battlefield." His talk was informal and helpful. He said in part:

"College athletes will readily admit, especially at this time, that physical contests are small in comparison with mental efforts. But the real conflict of life is not in the physical, mental or moral realm,—rather it is in the spirit and soul life. No conflict interests Satan more than the attempt to wrest from Christ a precious human soul.

"The temptation of Christ is a type of all the temptations that beset man today. The devil approaches men through appeals to their lower physical appetite and through their love for power. He finds the weak spots in the armor and attacks them. To yield to the second temptation makes a man stingy, selfish, ready to do anything for power, even to ruining the fortunes and reputation of others. The third temptation, 'to tempt God,' comes especially to the students. God is loving and good, but that does not justify procrastination and persistence in sin. Sin and rebellion will be punished.

"Paul describes the armor with which we are to withstand Satan, and the sword with which we are to fight him. This latter is the Word of God; it is to be our only offensive weapon; it needs not to be sharpened or reshaped, but to be used, in deadly combat with Satan, a powerful enemy, whom only the sternest effort can conquer."

ment of the general fund five years ago, more than thirty students have been enabled to complete their college course who could not otherwise have done so.

The University hopes to establish during the present year a loan fund of at least \$5,000, to be loaned under the direction of President Campbell, or some one designated by him, to young men and women all over Oregon, who wish to complete their education, but who cannot do so without assistance. It is believed that a loan of approximately \$100 a year, at a low rate of interest to be repaid in two years after graduation, is much more preferable than an outright gift in the form of a scholarship. The fund will be guaranteed by ten men against loss. Two signatures will be required on each note and a small amount of life insurance will be taken out to insure against loss by death.

The present loan fund amounts approximately to \$1000.

#### Secretary.

1. A secretary shall be elected by the conference to serve for the period of two years. He shall upon two weeks notice call a meeting of the conference to be held between February 1st and 10th, 1910, at such time and place as he shall designate, or at any other time upon the written request of three of the institutions of the conference.

2. In the event of the failure of the secretary to issue any such proper call, the chairman of the athletic committee of the institution, which he represents, shall issue the call.

#### Membership.

1. Any institution may become a member of this conference by making application to the secretary and subscribing to the articles of agreement upon the unanimous consent in writing of the members of the conference.

#### Amendments

1. A change in the articles of agreement of this conference may be declared adopted by the secretary upon the filing of written approval by each institution in the conference.

#### Date of Taking Effect.

This agreement shall take effect in each institution immediately after its commencement exercises in 1908.
