The order of events will consist of various athletic contests between classes, running, jumping, vaulting, weight throwing, wrestling and a tug-of-war. A great number of students have been training vigorously for some months in preparation for the event and rivalry for places will be very keen. Each evening both the track and gymnasium are very busy scenes with the practicing of the candidates for honors, and Trainer Hayward has his hands full directing the work.

The wrestling especially will be an interesting feature. Heretofore this has received very little attention from the University students. With the matches Friday, Hayward hopes to arouse a lasting interest in this wholesome and healthful sport. The University has no dearth of material. Pinkham, '10, at one time held the state amateur championship and Hathaway, '08, was considered several years ago to be one of Multnomah's most promising wrestlers. Sam May, freshman, is no novice in the art and there are a good many others who have had more or less experience. There will be matches pulled off between men of every class, from the heavyweights, such as Moulten and Ferris down to the bantams in which latter class Morgan, the miniature Hackenschmidt of Olympia, will meet "Kid" Otten of Portland.

Several events have been prepared especially for High School entries, so that in all there will be 21 events. Prizes will be given to the winner by various merchants of the town.
